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



"You and Mom tell me that we should love everybody, not just people who are nice to us," I said.


"I want to do what Jesus would do."

Miles doesn't call me names anymore. Now he just calls me Mikey. All of my friends call me Mikey, and Miles is one of my friends. •





The time is now yours, brothers and sisters," the bishop said, smiling. "We look forward to hearing your testimonies."





Jesus Chooses From Matthew 8:23-27; Mark 1:17-20; Mark 4:36-41; Luke 5:4-11; and Luke 6:12-16.

esus had been baptized by John the Baptist, and He ✓ had fasted for 40 days. Now it was time for Him to organize His Church and take the gospel to many places besides Galilee.

Jesus walked to the Sea of Galilee and got on a ship with a fisherman named Simon. "Let down your nets," Jesus told Simon.

Simon was surprised. All night long he and his brother Andrew had thrown their nets into the water, trying to catch fish. They had caught nothing. But now Simon tried once more, as Jesus had told him to.

The net filled up with so many fish that it broke! Simon had to call for help to pull the net back into the ship. Jesus told Simon and his brother Andrew, "Come ye after me, and I will make you to become fishers of men."

The two brothers left their boat and nets to follow Jesus and learn more about Him. Nearby, Jesus called brothers James and John to leave their ships and follow Him.

Jesus went up into a mountain and prayed all night. In the morning, He chose and ordained 12 men to be His Apostles. They would be with Him during His ministry and see the wonderful things He would do. They would be able to bear witness to others that He is the Son of God and our Savior. Jesus gave them priesthood authority to preach the gospel and heal the sick.

The first Apostle whom Jesus ordained was Simon, the fisherman whose net broke. Jesus gave Simon the new name of Peter. Next He called the fishermen James, John, and Andrew. Jesus then called Philip, Bartholomew, Matthew, and Thomas. He also ordained James, Simon, Judas, and Judas Iscariot. Jesus chose each one for a special purpose.

One evening, Jesus and His disciples were in a ship headed to the far side of the Sea of Galilee. As they sailed, Jesus fell asleep in the ship.

While Jesus slept, great winds began to blow and waves beat upon the ship. The tempest filled the disciples with fear. They woke Jesus up and pleaded, "Lord, save us: we perish."


Jesus stood up. He rebuked the wind and said to the sea, "Peace, be still."

Niya thanked him and started walking home.


As she walked, she looked at the money the shopkeeper had given her. "He gave me too much change," she thought. "Now I can have this money for myself!"

Niya felt warm and happy inside as she walked home. She knew Heavenly Father was pleased that she had chosen to be honest. •







We believe that the first principles and ordinances of the Gospel are: first, Faith in the Lord Jesus Christ; second, Repentance; third, Baptism by immersion for the remission of sins; fourth, Laying on of hands for the gift of the Holy Ghost.

Baptism is the first step in becoming a member of Jesus Christ's Church. We can be baptized when we are eight years old. At age eight, we are old enough to know the difference between right and wrong.

is given to us by a priesthood holder after we are baptized. The Holy Ghost prompts us to choose the right, comforts us, and helps us understand eternal truths. 
Definitions

Ordinance: An ordinance is a sacred act performed by the authority of the priesthood. Baptism and confirmation are ordinances.









Bunny Buns


This recipe was first printed in the *Friend* in 1980. In Friends by Mail, on the inside front cover, you can read about a family who has been making bunny buns ever since!

Remember to ask an adult for help when you make a Kitchen Crafts recipe!



- 1 package active dry yeast
- 1/4 cup warm water
 - 1 cup milk, warmed not quite to boiling
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/4 cup orange juice
 - 2 tablespoons grated orange peel
- 5 1/2 cups flour, sifted

Glaze: 2 cups powdered sugar, 1/4 cup hot water, 1 teaspoon butter



2. Sprinkle yeast in the warm water and set aside.

3. In another bowl, blend milk, sugar, shortening, and salt. Cool until lukewarm, then add eggs, water with yeast, orange juice, and orange peel.

4. Stir in flour a few cups at a time to make a soft dough. Let stand for 10 minutes.

S. Knead dough 5–10 minutes on a lightly floured surface until dough is smooth and elastic. Place it in a lightly greased bowl, turning once to grease surface. Cover bowl with a clean towel and put it in a warm place. Let dough rise for 2 hours, or until double in size. Punch dough down and let stand for 10 minutes.

6. On a lightly floured surface, roll dough into a rectangle ½ inch thick. Cut dough into strips ½ inch wide and 14 inches long. Roll between hands into rounded snake shapes. Cut one strip into pieces ½ inch long, and roll into balls.

7. Place one long piece of dough on a greased cookie sheet. Place one end of the strip over the other to make a loop; bring the end that is underneath up and cross it over the other end.

Place a ball of dough on top of the bottom loop.

8. Cover bunnies and let rise in a warm place for 45–60 minutes, until nearly double in size. Bake at 375°F (190°C) for 12–15 minutes.

9. For the glaze, stir powdered sugar, water, and butter together. Frost bunnies with the glaze while they are still warm.



SATURDAY

An important holiday called Passover was only six days away. Many people were coming to Jerusalem so they could offer sacrifices in the temple on that day. Jesus walked to Bethany, a village near Jerusalem. He would stay there for five nights with His friends Lazarus, Mary, and Martha. Mary anointed His feet with oil. See John 12:1-3.



SUNDAY

Jesus walked from Bethany to Jerusalem. He rode into the city on a donkey, as a verse in the Old Testament said He would. People recognized Him as their King, shouting, "Hosanna," and laying down palm leaves in front of the donkey to keep dust from getting on the Savior. Jesus visited the temple and then returned to Bethany.

See Zechariah 9:9; Matthew 21:1-11: Mark 11:1-11.



MONDAY

Jesus saw people buying and selling things in the temple. Because He wanted the temple to be a "house of prayer," He made them leave. Then He healed people who were lame or blind. The jealous priests were angry with Him.

See Matthew 21:12-17; Mark 11:15-19.



TUESDAY

Jesus taught people in the temple and on a nearby hill called the Mount of Olives. The priests plotted to kill Jesus. One of His disciples, Judas Iscariot, agreed to turn Jesus over to the priests in exchange for 30 silver coins. See Matthew 25:31-46; 26:14-16.


ou can prepare for Easter by learning about what happened during the week before Jesus Christ's Crucifixion and Resurrection. Starting eight days before Easter, read the events and scripture verses listed for each day.



WEDNESDAY

The scriptures do not say what Jesus did on this day. He may have spent the day with His disciples. You could read the parable of the ten virgins, a story Jesus taught to His disciples to help them prepare for His Second Coming.

See Matthew 25:1-13.



THURSDAY

Jesus's disciples got ready for the Passover meal. During the meal, Jesus told the disciples that one of them would betray Him. Then, to help them remember Him, He gave them the sacrament for the first time. Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane to suffer for our sins and to pray to God. People came with swords and arrested Him. The disciples ran away in fear.

See Matthew 26:17-29, 36-56.



FRIDAY

Jesus was taken to the high priest, Caiaphas. Jesus's disciple Peter denied that he knew Him. Jesus was questioned by the governor, Pilate, and by the king, Herod. So I did. I bore my testimony because of the courage of a


four-year-old girl. The man's attitude softened, and the Spirit came into his home.

Coleson took a drink from his water bottle. He looked at the road that rose in front of him. "I *will* make it up this hill," he told himself.



"I'm proud of you," Dad said. "Today was a rough day, and you made it."


"Yep," Coleson said. "And I'm going to make it all the way to Chicago."







They turned to chapter 17, verse 21.


"'And he took their little children, one by one, and blessed them, and prayed unto the Father for them,'" Dad read.

"Jesus had time to bless all of those children?" Annie asked.







Jesus was crucified and died, but after three days He was resurrected. He lived again! Because He was resurrected, we will be resurrected too. This means that our


bodies and spirits will be reunited forever.
