From Matthew 8:23–27; Mark 1:17–20; Mark 4:36–41; Luke 5:4–11; and Luke 6:12–16.


Jesus stood up. He rebuked the wind and said to the sea, “Peace, be still.”

The sea is really a large lake. It is 12.5 miles (20 km) long and 7.5 miles (12 km) wide. It is 680 feet (207 m) below sea level, where the weather is very hot. Cold air blows down from the nearby hills, often causing sudden storms on the lake.
