This haiku is marked to show the number of beats in each line. You can clap along with the beats to help you hear and count them. Words like "reading" and "scriptures" have two beats because they have two syllables.

1 2 3 4 5 helps me learn a bout Je-sus 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 and the things He taught. 1 2 3 4 5


Here are some more haikus:

Loving and serving help me see other people like Jesus sees them. A haiku (pronounced "hy-koo") is a type of short poem from Japan. You can use it to tell a story, express an idea, or show how you feel. To write a haiku, just listen to the beat. The first line has five beats (or syllables), the second line has seven, and the third line has five.
