

hile I was serving as a young bishop, Sister McKee, a widow in my ward, passed away. Among her things were three pet canaries. Two, with perfect yellow coloring, were to be given to her friends. The third, Billie, had yellow coloring **marred** by gray on his wings. Sister McKee had written in a note to me: "Will you and your family make a home for Billie? He isn't the prettiest, but his song is the best."

Sister McKee was much like her yellow canary with gray on its wings. She was not blessed with beauty, gifted with **poise**, or honored by **posterity**. Yet her song helped others to more willingly bear their burdens.

We are sons and daughters of a living God in whose image we have been created. Think of that: *created in the image of God*.

In our world, **moral character** ofttimes seems **secondary** to beauty or charm. But from long ago the Lord's counsel to Samuel the prophet echoes: "The Lord seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart" (1 Samuel 16:7).

When the Savior sought a man of faith, He did not select him from the **throng** of the self-righteous who were found regularly in the **synagogue.** Rather, He called him from among the fishermen of Capernaum. Doubting,

unschooled, **impetuous** Simon became Peter, Apostle of faith. A yellow canary with gray on his wings qualified for the Master's full confidence and **abiding** love.



Jesse read another scripture story, and then another. Soon he didn't feel afraid anymore.


the Holy Ghost.

When Dad saw the golden breadsticks and juicy meatballs at dinnertime, he thought Mom had broken the rules about her hand.


"No, the girls did it all!" Mom said proudly.

"Adam and Eve had to leave the Garden of Eden," Martin said.


"And it was really pretty there!" Lucas added.

"We learned in Primary that they loved their city and


as a family, and we know that Heavenly Father will help us through our challenges."



- 1. Washing your hands is an important thing you can do to keep from getting sick. All day long you touch things, and germs stick to your hands. When you wash your hands, the germs go down the drain instead of into your body where they could make you sick. When you wash your hands after you sneeze or blow your nose, you are washing away the germs that could make other people sick.
- 2. Just as when you wash your hands, germs and dirt go down the drain when you bathe regularly. When you wash your body you are helping your skin keep out germs and other dirty things that could make you sick.
- 3. When teeth get dirty, they start to decay. When that happens, they hurt! Brushing your teeth twice a day helps them stay healthy and strong.





I chased after him and pulled him down to put out the flames. The thought came to me to have him stand in the canal near our home. I told him to do that while I put out the rest of the fire.

I know I had Heavenly Father's help in knowing what I needed to do to put out the fire that day. The doctors said that if I hadn't told my brother to stand in the cold water of the canal, he would have needed surgery from the burns. Instead he healed so well that there was only one small scar on his foot. It was a miracle.

I know that Heavenly Father listens to our prayers and that He watches over us. He stands ready to help us when we pray, listen, and follow the promptings of the Holy Ghost.

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350°F (177°C).
- 2. In a bowl, beat the eggs and the milk together.
- 3. Scramble the eggs in a skillet over medium heat. Season with salt and pepper.
- 4. Toast the waffles according to package instructions.
- 5. Spoon half of the eggs onto a toasted waffle. Top with a slice of cheese and one more waffle. Press down firmly. Repeat for the other sandwich.
- 6. Place the sandwiches on a baking sheet and bake in the oven for 5 minutes, or until the cheese melts.
- 7. Remove the sandwiches from the oven. Cut them in half and serve.

*If frozen waffles aren't available, you can use toasted bread or tortillas.



The next day I couldn't tell if Mom was willing to invite the missionaries over, so I started on my homework. But all I could think about was asking the missionaries about baptism and what they believe.


