At Easter we remember that our Savior Jesus Christ suffered for us, paid for our sins, died, and was resurrected—a gift we call the Atonement. Through this great gift, the Savior made it possible for us to live again with Heavenly Father and our families.

President Thomas S. Monson explained the gift of the Atonement by telling the story of a young boy who wanted to buy a bicycle.

Every year, the police department of a big city held an auction to sell all the lost or stolen bikes that had been found during the year. One year, almost 100 bikes were being sold. As the auctioneer started the auction, he noticed an 11-year-old boy sitting near the front of the room.

"One dollar!" the boy called out as the first bike went up for bid. But the bidding went much higher, and the bike was sold to someone else. "One dollar," the boy repeated hopefully each time a bike came up. But each bike was sold for much more money than the boy had. The auctioneer watched as the boy tried over and over to buy a bike.

Finally, just one bike was left. The bidding went to eight dollars. Suddenly the auctioneer spoke up. "Sold to that boy over there for nine dollars!" he said. He took eight dollars from his own pocket and asked the boy for his one dollar.

> The boy gave the auctioneer his dollar's worth of pennies, nickels, dimes, and quarters. He took his new bike and started to leave. Then he parked his bike, gratefully threw his arms around the auctioneer's neck, and cried.

Like the boy in the story, we all want something that we cannot get for ourselves. We want to return to live with Heavenly Father and our families. Like the auctioneer who sacrificed his own money to give the boy a bike, Jesus Christ sacrificed His own life to give us the great gift of the Atonement. Because of that gift, we can be resurrected and return to live with Heavenly Father. •

1/2 teaspoon salt

- The Philippines is made up of more than 7,000 islands! If you scrunched them all up into one piece of land, it would be about the size of Italy.
 - The Philippines has over 200 volcanoes, but only 22 are active. It's part of the "Ring of Fire"—an area with many volcanoes.
 - The official languages are Tagalog and English, but more than 100 other languages are spoken in the Philippines.

Have everyone stand in a circle. Gently toss the ball into the air. When the ball comes down, hit it back up with any part of your body. - 3. Roll a teaspoon of dough into a small tube shape in your hands. 4. Roll the candy tube in the bowl of sugar, then wrap the candy in a square of waxed paper or cellophane.
- 5. Repeat until all your candy is ready to share!

Flying kites the Friday before Easter is a tradition on the island of Bermuda. Kites rising in the air remind people of how Jesus Christ rose from the tomb.

Here's a kite you can make. Be sure to ask an adult for help.

You will need:

one 24-inch (61-cm) stick or dowel one 20-inch (51-cm) stick or dowel a blade to cut notches spool of string colored tissue paper or newspaper glue masking tape strips of cloth or plastic for a tail

Building the Frame

- 1. Have an adult cut notches in the ends of both sticks.
- 2. Draw a mark 6 inches (15 cm) down the longer stick. Mark the middle of the shorter stick. Line up the two marks and tie the sticks together.
- 3. Wrap string twice around and through the notches of all four sticks.

Making the Sail

- 1. Cut out a paper outline. Leave about 1 inch (2.5 cm) beyond the string.
- 2. Place glue on each paper edge. Fold the paper over the string.

Making the Cradle

- 1. Reinforce the top and bottom points with masking tape.
- 2. Punch small holes in the paper on both sides of the stick at the top and bottom.
- 3. Tie a 30-inch (76-cm) loop of string through the holes. Tie your spool of string to the loop about a third of the way down.

Finishing and Flying

- 1. Make a 12-foot (4-m) tail, about 2 inches (5 cm) wide. Tie the tail to the bottom of the kite.
- 2. Head to a wide-open space on a windy day and let it fly!

PORTER'S

When my father-in-law passed away, our family gathered together to greet people who came to pay their respects. Throughout the evening, as I visited with family and friends, I often noticed our 10-year-old grandson, Porter, standing near my mother-in-law—his granny. Sometimes he was behind her, watching over her. Once I noticed his arm linked with hers. I watched him pat her hands, give her little hugs, and stand by her side.

For several days after that experience, I couldn't get this picture out of my mind. I was prompted to send Porter an email. I told him what I had seen and felt. I also reminded him of the **covenants** he had made when he was baptized, quoting Alma's words in Mosiah chapter 18: "And now, as ye are desirous to come into the fold of God, and to be called his people, and are willing to bear one another's burdens, that they may be light;

"Yea, and are willing to mourn with those that mourn; yea, and comfort those that stand in need of comfort, and to stand as witnesses of God at all times and in all things, and in all places that ye may be in, even until death, . . . that ye may have eternal life—

"... If this be the desire of your hearts, what have you against being baptized in the name of the Lord, as a witness before him that ye have entered into a **covenant** with him, that ye will serve him and keep his commandments, that he may pour out his Spirit more abundantly upon you?" (verses 8–10).

PROMISE

A **covenant** is a promise between you and Heavenly Father. How many times can you find this word in the story?

I explained to Porter that Alma taught that those who want to be baptized need to be willing to serve the Lord by serving others—for your whole life! I said: "I don't know if you realized it, but the way you showed love and concern for Granny was keeping your **covenants**. We keep our **covenants** every day as we are kind, show love, and take care of each other.

"I just wanted you to know I'm proud of you for being a **covenant** keeper! As you keep the **covenant** you made when you were baptized, you will be prepared to be ordained to the priesthood. This additional **covenant** will give you more opportunities to bless and serve others and help you to prepare for the **covenants** you will make in the temple.

"Thank you for being such a good example to me!

Thank you for showing me what it looks like to be a **covenant** keeper!"

Porter replied back: "Grandma, thanks for the message. When I was always hugging Granny, I didn't know that I was keeping my **covenants**, but I felt warm in my heart and felt really good. I know that it was the Holy Ghost in my heart."

I also felt warm in my heart when I realized that Porter knows that when he keeps his **covenants**, he will "always have [Heavenly Father's] Spirit to be with [him]" (D&C 20:77). This is a promise made possible by receiving the gift of the Holy Ghost. **♦**

HOW TO CONDUCT MUSIC

- Look at the two numbers at the beginning of the song. The top number tells you how many beats are in each measure or small section of the song. This song has four beats in each measure.
- 2. Lift your hand and hold it in a relaxed way with your fingers close together.
 - a. Beat one: Move your hand down.
 - b. Beat two: Move your hand left.
 - c. Beat three: Move your hand right.
 - d. Beat four: Move your hand up.
- 3. Repeat the pattern for each measure of the song: down, left, right, up, ... down, left, right, up.
- 4. Keep practicing, and soon you'll be ready to conduct a song for family home evening!
