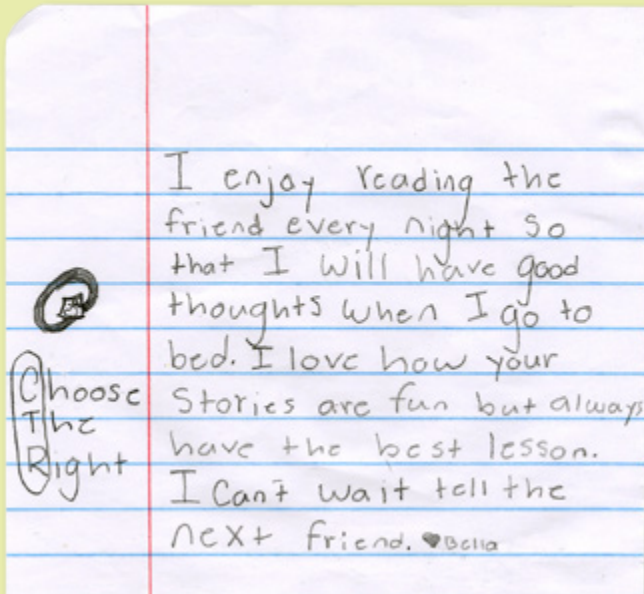

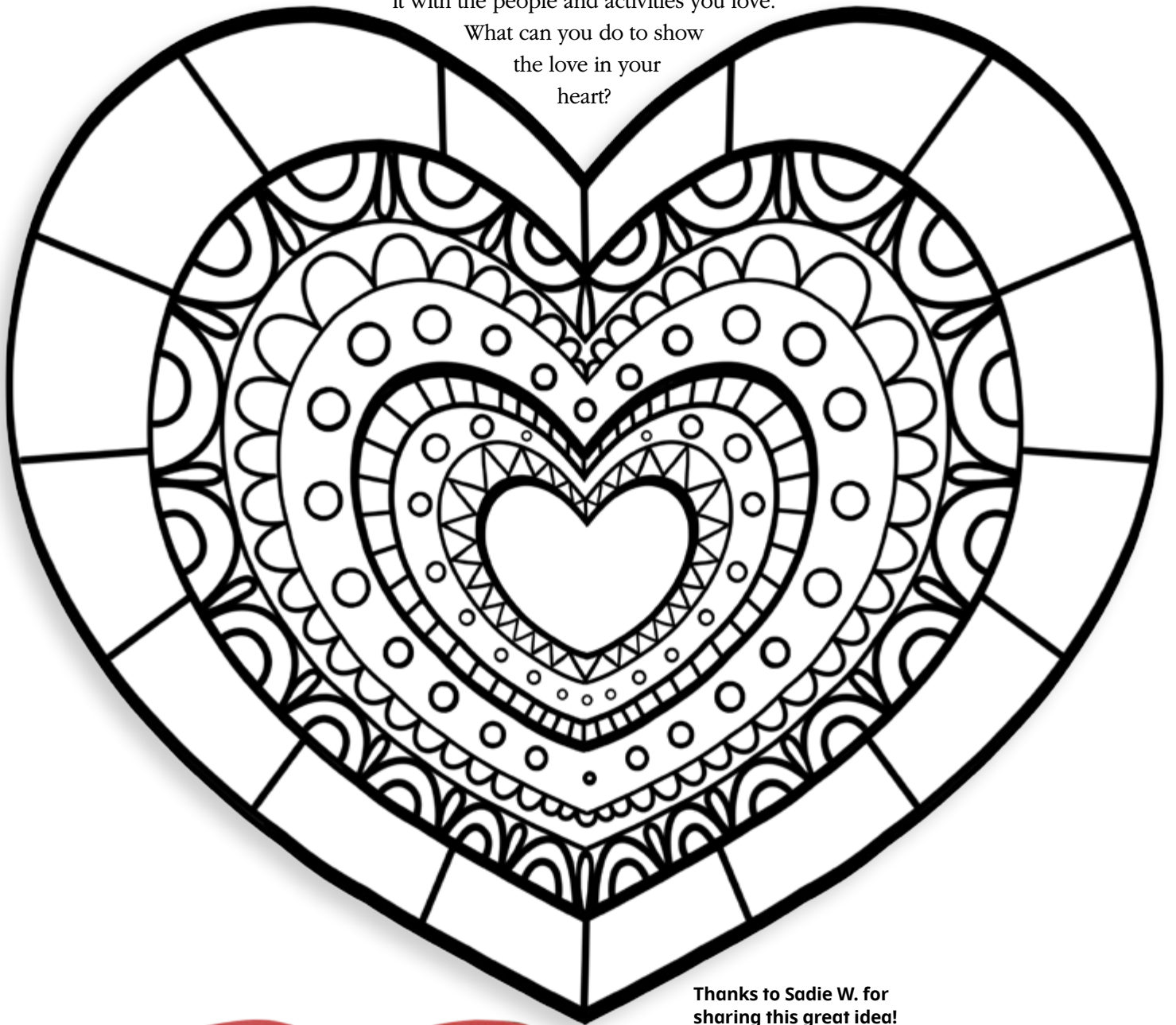

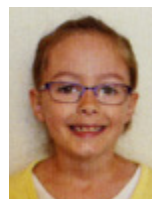
The rest of the morning zoomed by. Dylan helped carry the suitcases out to the car. He put on his backpack and double-checked that he had his favorite books.

FIG COOKIES

Figs are one of the foods Jesus talks about in the Bible. Here's an easy recipe you can make to celebrate what your family is learning about the New Testament this year!

1. Combine 1 cup dried figs, 1/2 cup raisins, 1 cup quick oats, and 1/2 cup shredded coconut in a food processor.
2. Blend until it no longer sticks to the sides of the bowl.
3. Take the dough and roll it into a log shape. Slice the log into 12 cookies.
4. Put 1/2 cup shredded coconut in a bowl. Coat each cookie in the coconut. Enjoy your cookies!

The next morning they put on white shirts and ties. When they got to the temple, they walked around it with the other families. They even got to take a picture with the golden angel Moroni. It was huge!

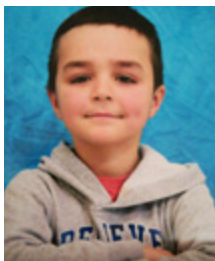
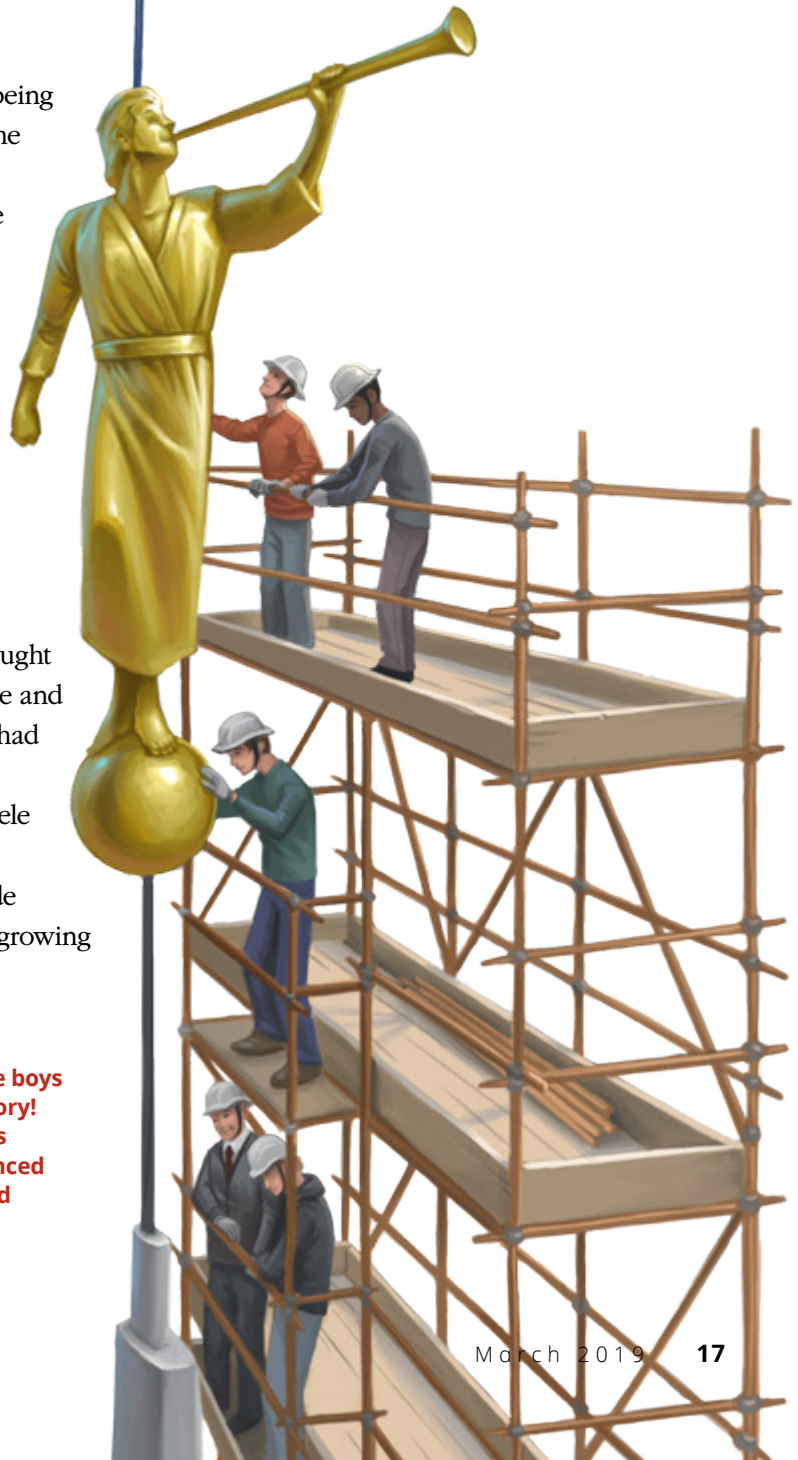

Although we don't know yet where or when the new temple will be built, Elder Uchtdorf encouraged everyone in Russia to get their lives ready for the day when a temple will be there.



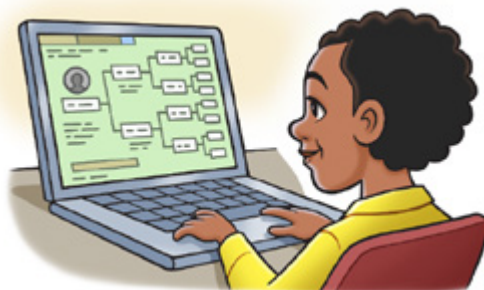

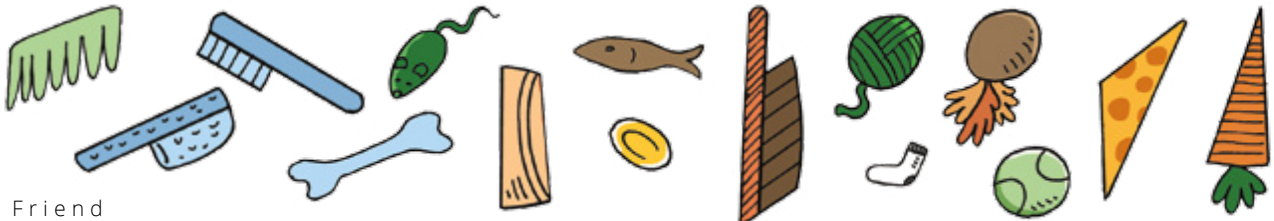

Lucy squinted. It wasn't Grandma. It was President Eyring! He was in the First Presidency.

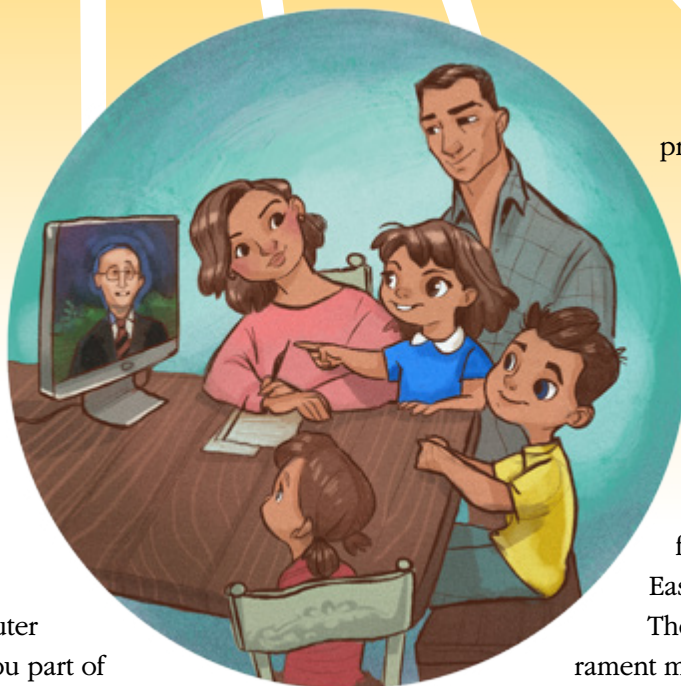
Dad pushed "play." President Eyring taught about supporting your Church leaders. He explained how Church leaders need us to pray for them.

Mini Spaghetti Pizzas

12 oz. package of spaghetti (about 340 g)

2 eggs, beaten

1 1/2 cups shredded mozzarella

1/2 cup grated Parmesan

1 cup pizza sauce

toppings: shredded mozzarella, chopped green bell pepper, mini pepperoni

1. Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C). Bring a pot of water to a boil. Add the spaghetti and cook until it is still a little firm, about eight minutes. Strain the spaghetti and place it in a large bowl.
2. Add the eggs, mozzarella, Parmesan, and pizza sauce to the spaghetti and mix.
3. Grease a muffin tin and fill the cups about three quarters of the way with the spaghetti.
4. Sprinkle each with mozzarella cheese, bell pepper, and mini pepperoni. Then bake in the oven until the cheese on top is melted and beginning to turn gold, about 15 minutes. Enjoy!

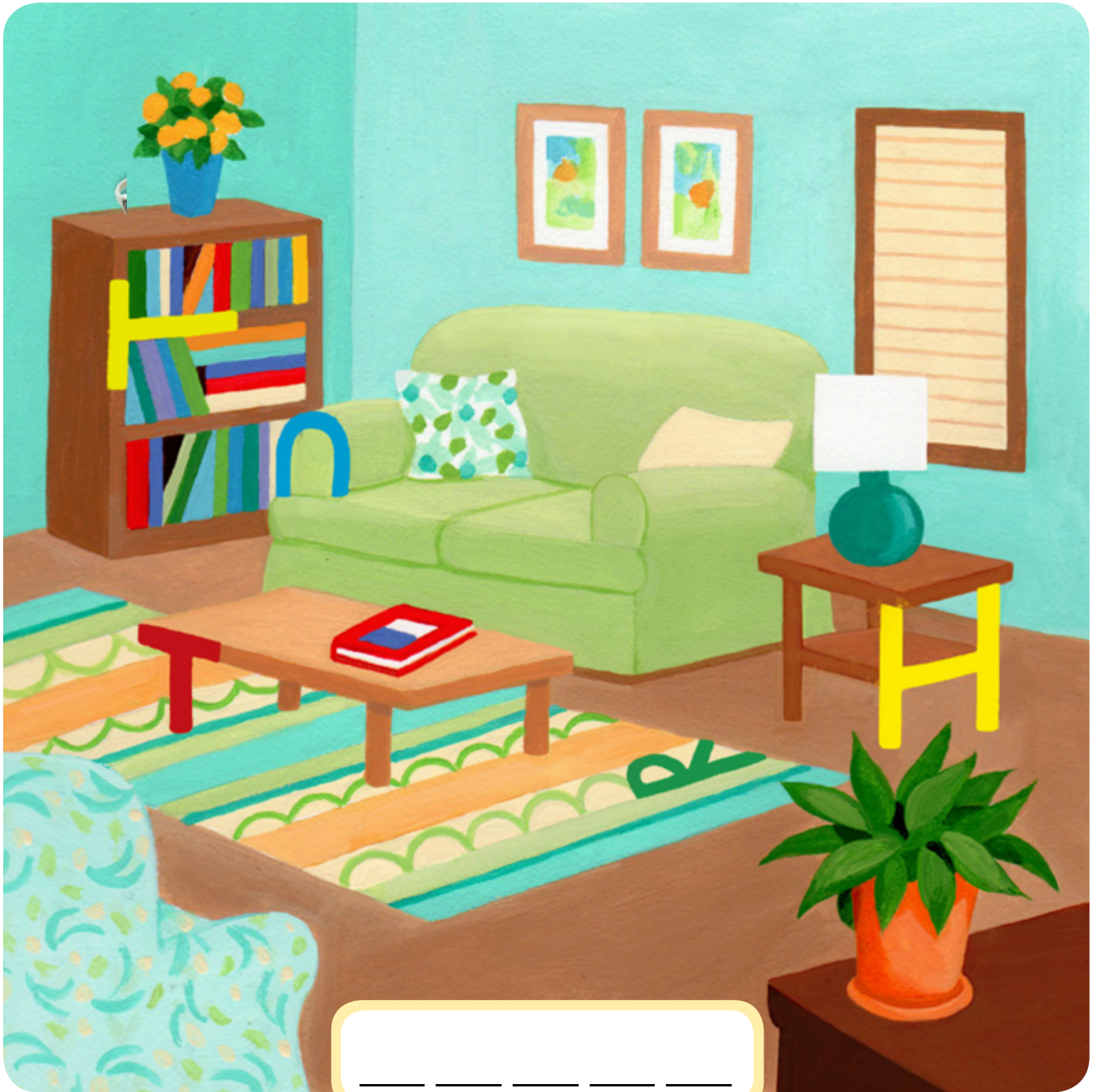

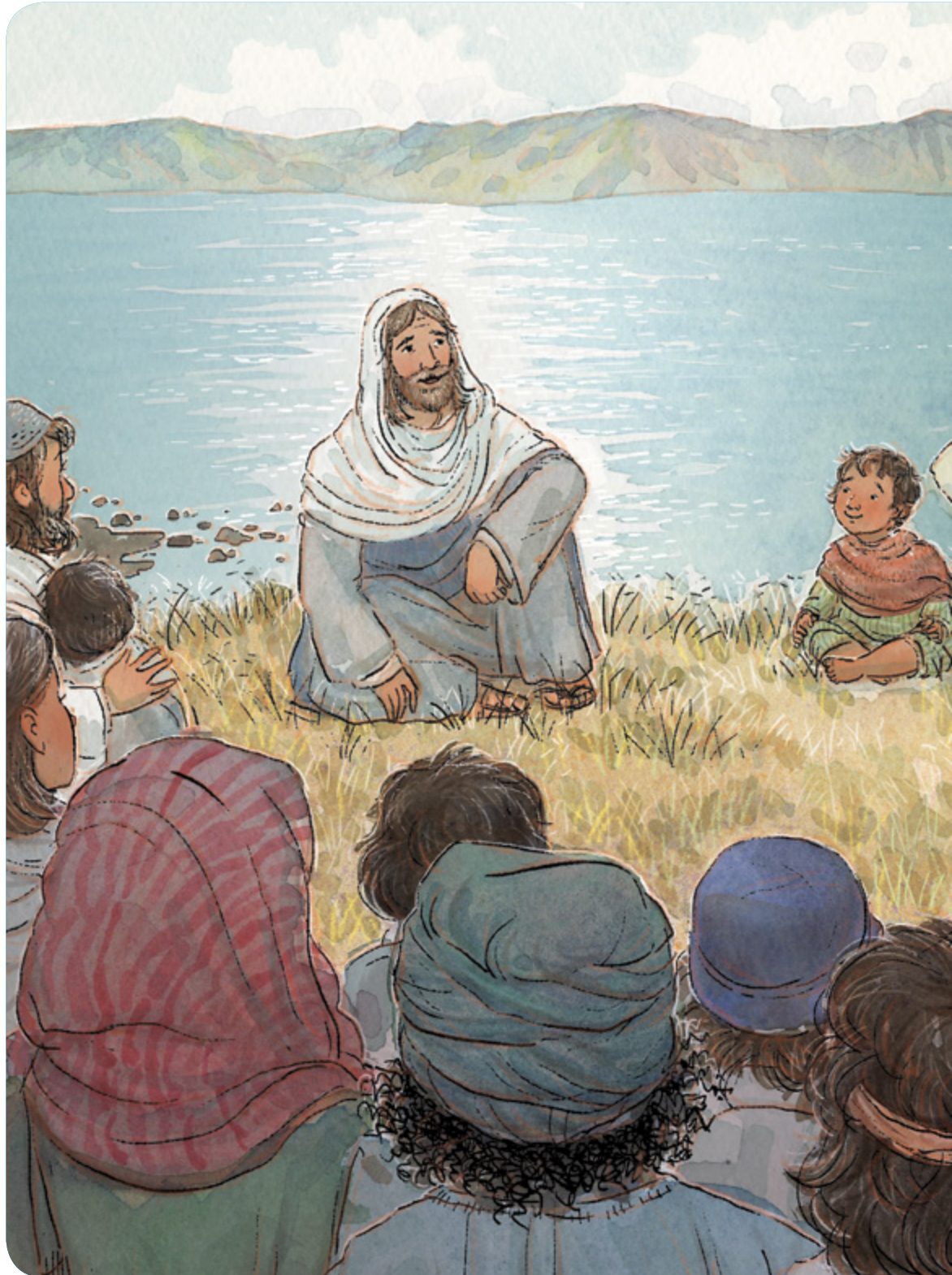

5. Listen. ”

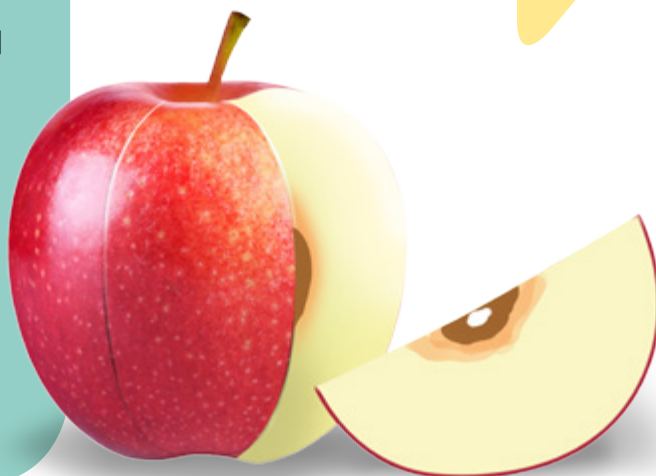

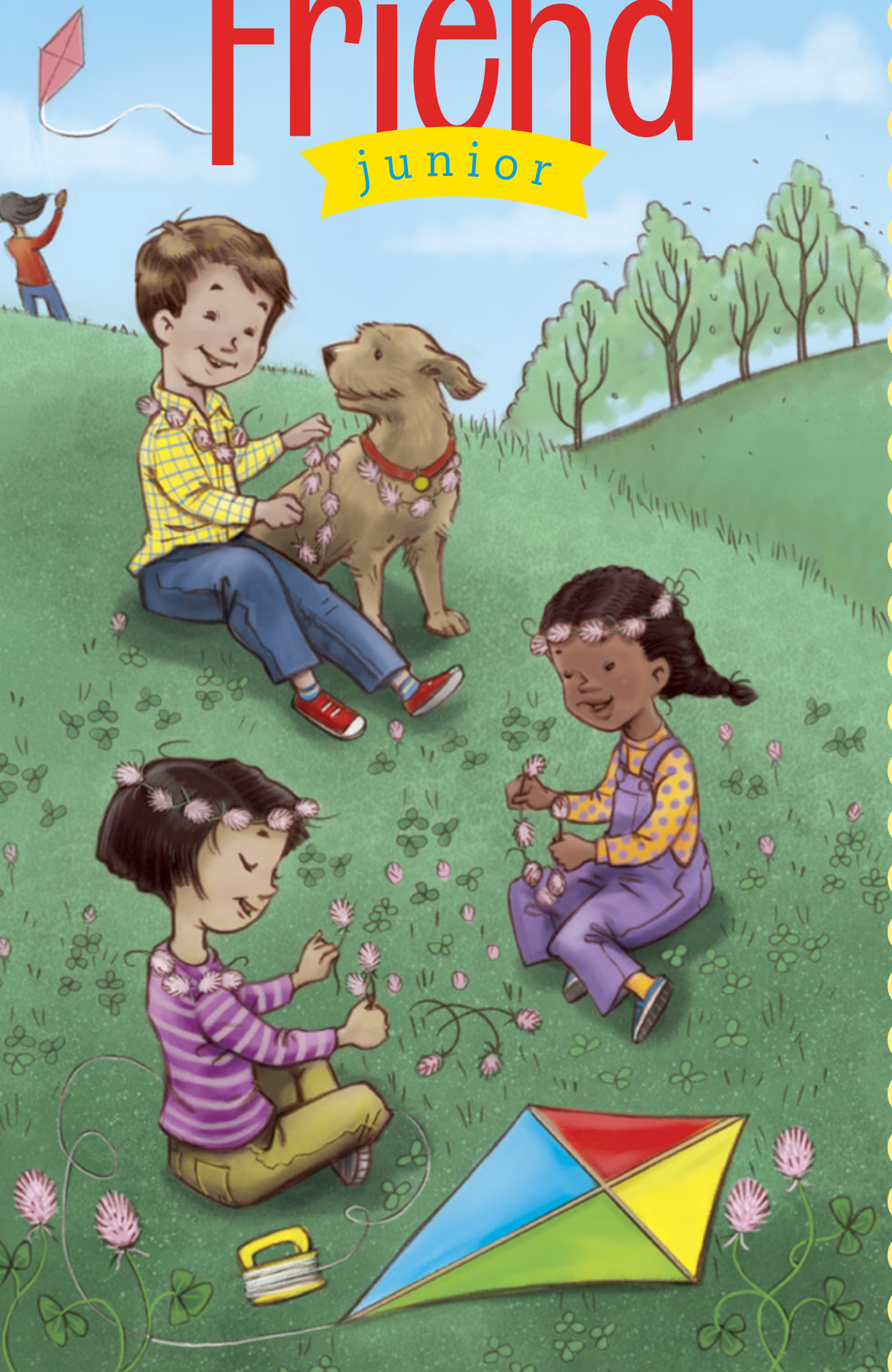
