
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


- Learn about Jesus Christ by reading the scriptures. Learn about His miracles.



"What?" Zamu asked.


"Let's go!" Zinathi pointed to his scooter.



"We could watch a movie instead," Mamá said.




LABOUR MISSIONARY IN NEW ZEALAND




My **FIRST** Fast

Charlotte had just one more question. "Does it look like I've been crying?" "Not a bit," Sister Henry said. Charlotte stood up. "Then I think I'm


ready to sing."




The Saints Build a New Home




