We must build the foundation of our lives on the rock of our Redeemer, Jesus Christ. Then when **spiritual earthquakes** happen, we will be able to stand strong.


Everything we learn in the temple helps us understand more about Jesus Christ. When your spiritual foun-




Conference was broadcast live in **55** languages, will be translated into **98** languages, and will reach **220** countries and territories!





"You bet!" Dad said. "Whenever you learn about your family, that's family history. It's a good idea to keep these stories so we can remember them later. Here. Let me show you."


Dad helped Helaman log in to FamilySearch.org and type in all the things his grandparents had told him.

"Hey, Lizzie?" Abby said. She pulled Lizzie down to whisper in her ear.


"I'm grateful for you!"


