TESTIMONY AND THE RESTORATION

Follow the example of Joseph Smith and the pattern of the Restoration. Turn to the scriptures. Kneel in prayer. Ask in faith. Listen to the Holy Ghost.

AS CHURCH LEADERS, we are often asked, "How do I receive a testimony of the restored gospel of Jesus Christ?"

Gaining a testimony and becoming converted begins with study and prayer, then living the gospel with patience and persistence and inviting and waiting upon the Spirit. The life of Joseph Smith and the pattern of the Restoration are excellent examples of this process. As [I share] . . . the events of the Restoration with you, look for the steps that lead to testimony. . . .

GREAT CONFUSION


Joseph Smith was born on December 23, 1805, in Sharon, Vermont, USA. He came into a family that prayed and studied the Bible. In his youth, he became interested in religion and discovered a "great confusion" over the doctrines of Christ, with "priest contending against priest, and convert against convert" (Joseph Smith—History 1:6).

This confusion . . . began centuries earlier in what has been called the Great Apostasy. The day of Christ "shall not come," said the Apostle Paul, "except there come a falling away first" (2 Thessalonians 2:3).

A few decades after Christ's Resurrection, His Apostles were killed, His teachings were corrupted, and the priesthood was taken from the earth. But Paul, seeing our day, prophesied "that in the dispensation of the fulness of times [God would] gather together in one all things in Christ" (Ephesians 1:10). He would restore Christ's true Church to the earth once more. . . .

JOSEPH FINDS AN ANSWER

Joseph..., at the age of 14, found himself caught in a "tumult of [religious] opinions." Often he asked himself, "If any one of [these churches] be right, which is it, and how shall I know it?" (Joseph Smith—History 1:10).



discouraged because of his weaknesses and imperfections]. But he did not lose faith or forget the power of prayer.

On September 21, 1823, at the age of 17, [Joseph] knelt to ask "for forgiveness of all [his] sins" . . . and [to know his] "standing before [God]" (see Joseph Smith—History 1:29). As he prayed, a light . . . appeared, increasing "until the room was lighter than at noonday" (verse 30). In that light there stood a personage dressed in a robe of "exquisite whiteness" (verse 31). He called Joseph by name and introduced himself as Moroni. He said "that God had a work for [Joseph] to do" and told him of an ancient record "written upon gold plates," which,

Joseph turned to the Bible for answers. "If any of you lack wisdom," he read in the Epistle of James, "let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him" (James 1:5).

Following James's direction, Joseph went to a grove of trees near his home and prayed. As he called upon God, "a pillar of light . . . descended," brighter than the noonday sun, and "two Personages" appeared. "One of them spake . . . , calling [Joseph] by name and said, pointing to the other—*This is My Beloved Son. Hear Him!*" (Joseph Smith—History 1:16–17).

God the Father and His Son, Jesus Christ, conversed with Joseph. They answered his question. They taught him that the true Church of Christ had been lost from the earth. Joseph learned that these members of the

Godhead were separate and distinct beings, They knew him by name, and They were willing to answer his prayers. The heavens were opened, the night of apostasy was over, and the light of the gospel began to shine forth.

Like Joseph, many of us find ourselves seeking the light of truth. . . . Like Joseph, we must search the scriptures, pray, . . . [be] humble, and [learn] to exercise faith.

MORONI AND THE GOLDEN PLATES

During the three years following his First Vision, Joseph [said he often felt when translated, became the Book of Mormon. The book contained a record of the fulness of the gospel. (See verses 33–34.) . . . Joseph was directed to . . . that record, buried . . . [in the] nearby Hill . . . Cumorah.

The next day Joseph found the plates, but the time had not yet arrived to bring them forth. Moroni instructed Joseph to meet him there that same day each year for the next four years (see verses 52–53). Joseph obeyed. Each year he went to the hill where Moroni gave him "instruction" (verse 54) concerning the Restoration of Christ's Church. . . .

Joseph received the plates on September 22, 1827, at the age of 21. He also received an ancient instrument for translating them, called the Urim and Thummim. Using this sacred interpreter, along with the Holy Ghost, Joseph began the work of translation. . . .

THE RESTORATION UNFOLDS

At the age of 23, Joseph was translating the plates when he and [his scribe], Oliver [Cowdery,] came upon a passage about baptism for the remission of sins. . . . They wanted to know more. Joseph knew what to do.

On May 15, 1829, [Joseph and Oliver] went into the woods to inquire of the Lord. While they were praying,

John the Baptist appeared "in a cloud of light" (Joseph Smith—History 1:68). He . . . had baptized the Savior in life, [and] he held the priesthood keys necessary to perform that ordinance by the authority of God.

...John ... laid his hands on [Joseph's head and then Oliver's] and conferred the Aaronic Priesthood upon [each] of them (see D&C 13; Joseph Smith—History 1:68–69).... In late May or early June 1829, the Melchizedek, or higher, Priesthood was conferred on Joseph and Oliver by the Apostles Peter, James, and John.

The translation of the Book of Mormon was also completed that June, and the book was published on March 26, 1830. . . . Days later,

A PATTERN FOR US TO FOLLOW


Brothers and sisters, can we see the pattern? Every major event of the Restoration—the First Vision, the appearance of Moroni and the coming forth of the Book of Mormon, the restoration of the priesthood, and the appearance of Jesus Christ [in] His holy temple—was preceded by prayer. . . .

[Many times] I have felt the undeniable witness of the Spirit of God, like a fire burning in my heart, that the restored gospel is true. . . . [If you do not know these things for yourself,] may I suggest accepting the invitation extended by Moroni in the Book of Mormon: "And when ye shall receive these things, I would exhort you that ye would ask God, the Eternal Father, in the name of Christ, if these things are not true; and if ye shall ask with a sincere heart, with real intent, having faith in Christ, he will manifest the truth of it unto you, by the power of the Holy Ghost. And by the power of the Holy Ghost ye may know the truth of all things" (Moroni 10:4–5). . . .

... Follow the example of Joseph Smith and the pattern of the Restoration. Turn to the scriptures. Kneel in prayer. Ask in faith. Listen to the Holy Ghost. . . . And in the name of Jesus Christ, I promise, "If ye will . . . ask [Heavenly Father] in faith, believing that ye shall receive, with diligence in keeping [the Lord's] commandments, surely these things shall be made known unto you" (1 Nephi 15:11). **NE**

on April 6, the Church was formally organized. . . . As prophesied by Paul, the ancient Church of Christ was once again established on the earth.

But the work of the Restoration was not over. . . . [The Kirtland Temple, the first temple built in this dispensation,] was dedicated . . . on March 27, 1836. One week later, on April 3, a meeting was held there. Following a solemn and silent prayer, . . . the Lord Jesus Christ [appeared to Joseph and Oliver.] . . . Moses, Elias, and Elijah also appeared [in the Kirtland Temple] and [gave priesthood keys] to Joseph (see D&C 110).

ave you ever imagined what it would have been like to be a Nephite when Jesus Christ appeared? Try it. Imagine you are at the temple in Bountiful in ancient America. Not long ago, you endured terrifying tempests, earthquakes, fires, and whirlwinds. You survived, but thousands did not (see 3 Nephi 8). You probably lost your home and maybe even some family and friends. You might be feeling like your world is shattered and your life is completely ruined.

Maybe you're at the temple in Bountiful to find some kind of comfort. It's good to be with others, but you still feel lost, confused, and sad.

Suddenly, you hear a voice. You can't understand it at first, but the third time you hear it, you do.

"Behold my Beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased, in whom I have glorified my name—hear ye him" (3 Nephi 11:7).

You look up and see your Savior.


But He doesn't just want you to see Him.

"Arise and come forth unto me," He said (3 Nephi 11:14). He wants you to come unto Him.

ONE BY ONE

"And it came to pass that the multitude went forth, and thrust their hands into his side, and did feel the prints of the nails in his hands and in his feet; and this they did do, going forth one by one until they had all gone forth, and did see with their eyes and did feel with their hands, and did know of a surety and did bear record, that it was he, of whom it was written by the prophets, that should come" (3 Nephi 11:15; italics added).

Have you ever noticed the words "one by one"? "Come forth unto me" wasn't a general statement. He




wanted them to go forth one by one. He could've just introduced Himself, but He wanted every single person there to know who He was for themselves. He wanted them to individually come to Him, to meet Him, and to receive an up close and personal witness that He really is the Savior of the world. He wanted them to feel the prints in His hands and feet—the marks of the Atonement He'd completed just for them. Just for you. Can you imagine that?

KNOW HIM FOR YOURSELF

So what does that mean for us?

Jesus Christ still calls us to come unto Him, and that invitation is still extremely personal. He is the Savior of the world, but He is also the Savior of you. He is your personal



Savior. Because of His atoning sacrifice, He can comfort and strengthen you personally. And He wants you to know that for yourself.

Even though you can receive a testimony by believing on others' words (see D&C 46:13–14), it is important for you to gain and strengthen your own testimony. To do so, you can read stories of His example, immerse yourself in His words, ponder His teachings, and pray for a personal witness. You are supposed to have a very close and personal relationship with our Father in Heaven and His Son, Jesus Christ.

Maybe you've endured tempests, earthquakes, fires, and whirlwinds, or maybe you've endured loneliness, sadness, depression, confusion, or disappointment. You might have even felt like your world is shattered and your life is completely ruined. And that's why having a personal relationship with the Savior is so important. You might not be able to feel the marks in His hands and feet every day, but you can still feel His love and the hope that comes from His Atonement.




He is there for you personally and can strengthen you so that you can get through anything. **NE**


magine reading *everything* about the Savior in the scriptures—the Holy Bible, the Book of Mormon, the Doctrine and Covenants, the Pearl of Great Price. Talk about a lot of time and work! But in January 2017, President Russell M. Nelson gave a challenge to do just that—to study everything that Jesus said and did in the standard works. President Nelson said that completing the project made him "a different man." He not only learned more about Jesus Christ but also felt a renewed devotion to Him.¹

You too can draw closer to Christ as you learn of Him. Studying His life and purpose invites His peace into your life and helps you come to know Him and Heavenly Father. Check out how these youth answered two questions: (1) What is your favorite scripture story about the Savior and why? (2) And how have your gospel studies brought you peace?

I like the story of the 10 lepers because Christ showed so much love toward the leper who thanked Him. He said, "Thy faith hath made thee whole" (Luke 17:19; see verses 11-19). I love the genuine kindness that He shows everyone.

Because of some recent tragedies at my school, everyone there is in need of a lot of peace and comfort. I've found strength and peace through my studies in seminary. The seminary teachers make the scriptures and the gospel very personalized for everyone. It's really cool to see the contrast in the seminary classroom compared to a normal classroom. There's just a different feeling there that brings peace.

I love when Christ comes to the Americas, asks if there are any sick and afflicted among them, and then heals them. Then He blesses the little children. (See 3 Nephi 17.) I think it's a really cool and powerful story. I like little kids, and I like when people give them extra love, because children are so pure. The story shows me the depth of the Savior's love for us. Since He loved the people back then enough to do everything He did, He can love us today too.

Isaiah 53:3 says the Savior is "a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief." When I think about Christ's Atonement, what He went through for us, and how I can be forgiven when I repent of my sins, I feel really peaceful. Many people in the Book of Mormon—the sons of Mosiah, Ammon, and Alma the Younger—had rocky pasts, but they were able to be forgiven. 

Here are some of those truths, illustrated by images of physical objects that were part of the last week of the Savior's life.

"MY KINGDOM IS NOT OF THIS WORLD"

(John 18:36).




MONEYCHANGERS' TABLES

See Matthew 21:12-16; Mark 11:15-19; Luke 19:45-48.

What are they? The tables where people would (for an outrageous fee) exchange other currencies for the Jewish half-shekel coin, which was accepted in the temple sanctuary. The priests and other temple officers allowed people to sell items that the law of Moses demanded for various temple sacrifices. Through greed and extortion, these leaders took advantage of those coming to worship God.

Early in His last week, Jesus Christ drove the moneychangers out of the temple. The sounds of clinking coins and barking salesmen echoing off of the temple walls must have been distracting and offensive to the spirit of worship and devotion that the Lord's house deserves. The Savior said, "It is written, My house shall be called the house of prayer; but ye have made it a den of thieves" (Matthew 21:13). They had allowed the things of the world to intrude upon the sacred space of His Father's house. But He showed that the place where we are meant to seek His Father's kingdom should be free from the distractions of the world.





PURPLE ROBE

See Matthew 27:28; Mark 15:17; John 19:2.

Purple was a kingly color, and the soldiers mockingly put this robe on Jesus Christ because He had claimed to be the king of the Jews. Of course, in reality He is much more than that— He is the "King of kings and Lord of lords" (1 Timothy 6:15; Revelation 19:16).





WIDOW'S MITE

See Mark 12:41-44; Luke 21:1-4.

What is it? A very small coin (a lepton), probably made of copper or brass, worth less than all others.

While at the temple that week, the Savior saw a poor widow throw two of these tiny coins into the temple treasury. He gathered His disciples and said that this woman's offering, though of the smallest amount, was greater than anyone else's, for "she of her want did cast in all that she had, even all her living" (Mark 12:44).

> What mattered to Him was her willingness to give, not the size of her offering. He showed yet again that "the Lord seeth not as man seeth; ... the Lord looketh on the heart" (1 Samuel 16:7) and that "my ways [are] higher than your ways" (Isaiah 55:9).

(John 2:19).



BOX OF OINTMENT

See Matthew 26:6-13; Mark 14:3-9; John 12:2-8.

What is it? Some kind of vessel made of alabaster, a soft gypsum compound often used for intricate ornamental carvings. It was used to store spikenard, a perfumed ointment made from Asian plants and quite valuable because of its rarity.

Early in the Savior's last week, Mary poured this box of ointment on Him. He said that it foreshadowed His death because perfumed ointments were also used to prepare bodies for burial (see John 19:39).





TEMPLE VEIL



See Matthew 27:51 Mark 15:38; Luke 23:45.

What is it? The temple veil was a curtain found in the Holy of Holies, the temple's innermost and most sacred room, which represented the presence of God. Only the high priest could go through the veil, and only once a year.

When Jesus Christ died, the veil of the temple was "rent in twain from the top to the bottom" (Matthew 27:51). "But Christ being come an high priest of good things to come, ... by his own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us" (Hebrews 9:11-12; see also verses 13-14). Through His death and Resurrection, He rent the veil separating us from God's presence (see Hebrews 10:19-22).

"BLOOD COMETH FROM EVERY PORE, SO GREAT SHALL BE HIS ANGUISH"

(Mosiah 3:7).



OLIVE PRESS

See Matthew 26:36; Mark 14:32; Luke 22:39-40; John 18:1.

"[Jesus Christ's] agony in Gethsemane and on the cross was greater than any mortal could bear. Nevertheless, because of His love for His Father and for us, He endured, and as a consequence, He can offer us both immortality and eternal life.

"It is poignantly symbolic that 'blood [came] from every pore' [Mosiah 3:7] as Jesus suffered in Gethsemane, the place of the olive press. To produce olive oil in the Savior's time, olives were first crushed by rolling a large stone over them. The resulting 'mash' was placed in soft, loosely woven baskets, which were piled one upon another. Their weight expressed the first and finest oil. Then added stress was applied by placing a large beam or log on top of the stacked baskets, producing more oil. Finally, to draw out the very last drops, the beam was weighted with stones on one end to create the maximum, crushing pressure. And yes, the oil is bloodred as it first flows out" (Elder D. Todd Christofferson of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles, Oct. 2016 general conference).







"HE WAS WOUNDED FOR OUR TRANSGRESSIONS, ... AND WITH HIS STRIPES **WE ARE HEALED"**



See Matthew 27:26.

What is it? A Roman flagrum or flagellum, a whip with multiple leather strands that had several small pieces of metal or bone attached to them, and sometimes with a hook at the end. The scourge was designed to quickly remove skin and flesh.

As was customary, after He was condemned, Jesus Christ was taken by the Roman soldiers to be scourged. "They scourge him, and he suffereth it; and they smite him, and he suffereth it. Yea, they spit upon him, and he suffereth it, because of his loving kindness and his long-suffering towards the children of men" (1 Nephi 19:9).



The crucifiers drove nails through the Savior's hands, writs, and feet to secure Him on the cross. "[Jesus Christ] has, he reminds us, 'graven thee upon the palms of my hands' (1 Nephi 21:16). Considering the incomprehensible cost of the Crucifixion, Christ is not going to turn his back on us now" (Elder Jeffrey R. Holland of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles, "Come unto Me," Ensign, Apr. 1998, 19).



CROSS

See Matthew 27:32; John 19:17.

What is it? The beam placed horizontally near the top of a tall upright post used by the Romans for public execution by crucifixion. These were probably made of a durable wood so that they could be reused. The beam, or cross, was separate from the post, and victims were made to carry it themselves to the place of crucifixion. They were then attached to the cross and lifted up onto the post. A man named Simon was asked to help Jesus Christ carry His cross (see Matthew 27:32).

The Savior said, "My Father sent me that I might be lifted up upon the cross; and after that I had been lifted up upon the cross, that I might draw all men unto me, that as I have been lifted up by men even so should men be lifted up by the Father, to stand before me, to be judged of their works" (3 Nephi 27:14).

He also taught that each of His disciples should "take up his cross" (Matthew 16:24), which means "to deny himself all ungodliness, and every worldly lust, and keep my commandments" (Joseph Smith Translation, Matthew 16:26 [in the Bible Appendix]).






EMPTY TOMB

See Matthew 28:1-8; John 20:1-18.

"The empty tomb that first Easter morning was the answer to Job's question, 'If a man die, shall he live again?' [Job 14:14]. To all within the sound of my voice, I declare, If a man die, he shall live again. We know, for we have the light of revealed truth" (President Thomas S. Monson (1927–2018), "He Is Risen," Apr. 2010 general conference).

If you had to summarize all of Easter in a single word, you might choose the word *love*.

We see the love of God the Father and His Only Begotten Son, Jesus Christ, in the central act of the Father's plan, the Savior's atoning sacrifice. The images of Jesus Christ in the Garden of Gethsemane and on the cross of Calvary are images of deep and eternal love. **NE**




My name is Alyona, and I live in Kharkiv, Ukraine.

Temple Tracking

Happy birthday to the Church! The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was organized April 6, 1830, and has been growing ever since. One fun way to track that growth is through the number of temples. The pace for building temples changes over the years, by revelation, but it's always moving forward.







Why does God allow war?

War has been part of the story of mankind on this earth since almost the beginning. But the Lord, the Prince of Peace, does not want us to wage war with one another. He weeps when people choose not to love one another and "are without affection, and ... hate their own blood" (Moses 7:33), corrupting the earth through violence (see Genesis 6:11-13). Those whose wickedness brings war to the earth will be judged for their actions.

The Lord has commanded His people to "renounce war and proclaim peace" (D&C 98:16). However, when nations do take up arms against each other, the Lord has also said that we are sometimes justified in defending our families, nations, and freedoms against destruction, tyranny, and oppression (see Alma 43:45–47; Alma 46:12–13; D&C 134:11). And Latter-day Saints who serve in their nations' militaries are upholding the principle of "being subject to kings, presidents, rulers, and magistrates" (Articles of Faith 1:12).




MODESTY SHOUT-OUT







