## FACE LIFE'S TESTS WITH THE SAVID R'S HELPP

**EVERY** person living is in the midst of a test. We have been granted by God the precious gift of life in a world created as a proving ground and a preparatory school. The tests we will face, their severity, their timing, and their duration will be unique for each of us. But two things will be the same for all of us. They are part of the design for mortal life.

First, the tests at times will stretch us enough for us to feel the need for help beyond our own. And, second, God in His kindness and wisdom has made the power of deliverance available to us.

#### THE PURPOSE OF LIFE'S TESTS

Now you might well ask, "Since Heavenly Father loves us, why does His plan of happiness include trials that could overwhelm us?" It is because His purpose is to offer us eternal life. He wants to give us a happiness that is only possible as we live as families forever in glory with Him. And trials are necessary for us to be shaped and made fit to receive that happiness that comes as we qualify for the greatest of all the gifts of God.

There are many different tests, but I will speak of only three. You may be in one of these tests now. It helps to know that these tests do not come from random chance or from a cruel God. For each, the power of deliverance is available—not to escape the test but to endure it well.

#### DEATH AND GRIEF

The first test we will consider is the tragedy that death can bring. Life ends early for some and eventually for us all. Each of us will be tested by facing the death of someone we love. The hardest part of that test is to know what to do with the sorrow, the loneliness, and the loss that can feel as if a part of us has been lost. Grief can persist like a chronic ache. And for some there may be feelings of anger or injustice.

The Savior's Atonement and Resurrection give Him the power to deliver us in such a trial. Through His experience He came to know all our griefs. He could have known them by the inspiration of the Spirit. But He chose instead to know by experiencing them for Himself (see Alma 7:11–12).

The Savior not only understands and feels grief but also feels *your* personal grief that only you feel. And He knows you perfectly. He knows your heart. So He can know which of the many things you can do that will be best for you as you invite the Holy Ghost to comfort and bless you. It is by the inspiration of the Spirit that we can have a testimony of the power of the Savior's Resurrection and a clear view of the glorious reunion ahead.

One day, we all will be resurrected. The loved one who dies will be resurrected as the Savior was. The reunion we will have with them will not be ethereal but with bodies that need never die nor age nor become infirm. I have felt that comfort when I looked down at the gravestone of someone I knew—someone that I know I can at some future time hold in my arms. Knowing that, I was not only delivered from grief but was filled with happy anticipation.

#### **OPPOSITION**

We came to earth to be tested to stay faithful to God through the physical and spiritual challenges that come to everyone. Even though the body is a magnificent creation, keeping it functioning is a challenge that tests us all.

Beyond the challenges of the body that come from within, we face the opposition of enemies from without. There is anger and hatred in the world around us, and some of it will at times be directed at us.

There is a guide for receiving the Lord's power of deliverance from opposition in life. It is, "Be thou humble; and the Lord thy God shall lead thee by the hand, and give thee answer to thy prayers" (Doctrine and Covenants 112:10).

The Savior showed us that humility. You have read of how He prayed in the garden while He was suffering a trial on our behalf beyond our ability to comprehend or to endure, or even for me to describe. You remember His prayer: "Father, if thou be willing, remove this cup from me: nevertheless not my will, but thine, be done" (Luke 22:42).

The Father did not deliver the Son by removing the trial. For our sakes He did not do that, and He allowed the Savior to finish the mission He came to perform. Yet we can forever take courage and comfort from knowing of the help that the Father did provide:

"And there appeared an angel unto him from heaven, strengthening him.

"And being in an agony he prayed more earnestly: and his sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground" (Luke 22:43–44).

The Savior prayed for deliverance. What He was given was not an escape from the trial but comfort enough to pass through it gloriously.

#### THE EFFECTS OF SIN

All of us will at times struggle to feel free from the effects of sin. Only the Savior had the power to resist every temptation and never sin. So the most important and most difficult trial for us all is to become clean and to know that we are. This requires humility before God. It takes submission to His will. It takes prayer and the willingness to obey. It takes serving others out of love for them and for the Savior. And it always requires and invites the Holy Ghost.

As you are delivered in trials, the Holy Ghost comes to you. Many of you have felt the result of frequent contact with the Holy Ghost. As that recurred again and again, you may have noticed a change in yourself. The temptations that once troubled you seemed to fade. People who once seemed difficult began to appear more lovable. You began to see almost unreasonable potential in very humble people. You came to care more about their happiness than about your own. If that change in you came, it was more likely gradual than sudden. Yet it was what the scriptures call the "mighty change" (Mosiah 5:2; Alma 5:12–14). And it is the evidence you and I need to have hope and assurance as we look forward to the great and final test (the Final Judgment) that comes after this life.

#### OUR SOURCE OF COMFORT

I bear you my solemn witness that God the Father lives and loves us. I know that. His plan of happiness is perfect, and it is a plan of happiness. Jesus Christ was resurrected, as we will be. He suffered so that He could succor us in all of our trials. He paid the ransom for all of our sins and those of all of Heavenly Father's children so that we could be delivered from death and sin. I know that in the Church of Jesus Christ the Holy Ghost can come to comfort and to cleanse us as we follow the Master.

I leave you my witness and my love, and I bless you that you may receive sufficient comfort and succor in your times of need, through all the tests and trials of your life. **NE**

## Jerusalem

#### Where the Savior Spent His Final Days

When Jesus Christ's mortal ministry was coming to a close, He returned to Jerusalem. He had visited here as an infant, as a young man, and at various times in His ministry. And He came here one last time to complete His most important mission: to atone for the sins of the world, die, and be resurrected.

Here are some of the places and events from the Savior's final days in Jerusalem. Other than the temple, Mount of Olives, Garden of Gethsemane, and Antonia Fortress, locations shown are best guesses for the places named.

**GARDEN TOMB** 

**ROAD TO EMMAUS HEROD'S PALACE HOUSE OF CAIAPHAS UPPER ROOM** 

#### <·>

Road to Emmaus The resurrected Jesus appeared to two of His disciples as they traveled (see Luke 24:13–35).

#### **<·>** Herod's Palace

After being arrested, Jesus was taken before Herod (see Luke 23:7–11).

#### <·>

Upper Room Jesus and the Twelve ate the Passover meal (the Last Supper). Jesus instituted the sacrament (see Luke 22:7–20).

#### <·>

House of Caiaphas Jesus was brought before the chief priests, and Peter denied that he knew Jesus

(see Matthew 26:57-75).

#### <·>

Garden Tomb Jesus's body was laid in a tomb (see John 19:38–42).

Angels opened the tomb (see Matthew 28:2–4).

Women found the tomb empty (see Mark 16:1–4; John 20:1–2); angels proclaimed, "He is risen" (see Matthew 28:5–7), and the women went to tell the disciples (see Luke 24:9–11). Jesus appeared to Mary Magdalene in the garden outside the tomb (see John 20:1–17).

<.> Golgotha Jesus was crucified (see Matthew 27:33–37).

#### **≺·≻** Antonia Fortress

Jesus was accused before Pilate, condemned, mocked, and scourged and Barabbas released (see John 18:28–19:16). This fortress was a likely location for these events.



#### <.> Temple

When Jesus died, there was an earthquake and the veil of the temple was rent (see Matthew 27:51).

#### **<**•>

Garden of Gethsemane Jesus Christ suffered for our sins, pains, and sicknesses (see Alma 7:11–13); then He was betrayed and arrested (see Matthew 26:36–46; Luke 22:39-54).

#### <.>

#### Mount of Olives

Jesus foretold the destruction of Jerusalem and the temple, which Roman armies carried out in 70 A.D. and again in 130 A.D. He also spoke of His Second Coming (see Matthew 24, Joseph Smith—Matthew).

Forty days after His Resurrection, Jesus Christ ascended into heaven (see Acts 1:9-12).

At His Second Coming, the Savior will return here, and the mount will split in two (see Zechariah 14:4; Doctrine and Covenants 45:48).

#### **<**•> **Road to Bethany**

Jesus rode a colt for His triumphal entry into Jerusalem, and people laid palm leaves before Him (see Matthew 21:1-11; John 12:12-18). He lodged in Bethany for much of that week (see Matthew 21:17).

## THE PASSOVER SUPPER

THE FIRST PASSOVER SYMBOLIZED JESUS CHRIST'S SACRIFICE AND SHOWED WHAT IT MEANS TO BE GOD'S COVENANT PEOPLE.

n Moses's day, thousands of years ago, the firstborn in Egypt were dying in the final plague. But God provided a way for His people to be spared. If they performed a symbolic ritual, the destroying angel would pass over them. In this way, the children of Israel showed that they were God's people. And through the Passover, God saved them from destruction, delivered them from bondage, and sent them to inherit a promised land. (See Exodus 12.)

Here's a brief description of the different parts of the Passover. They represent various aspects of Jesus Christ's ultimate sacrifice for our sins, as well as our covenant with God.

#### BITTER HERBS

Possibly endive, chicory, wild lettuce, horehound, sorrel, dandelions, horseradish, parsley, snakeroot, peppermint, or other herbs with a bitter taste. **How it was used:** Eaten along with the lamb.

**Represents:** Bitterness of slavery and captivity in Egypt; bitterness of slavery to sin; bitterness of Christ's suffering for our sins.



#### LAMB

A year-old lamb without blemish. **How it was used:** Killed and then roasted with fire, whole—no bones broken; head, legs, and edible inner parts attached. It was to be eaten during the Passover night, nothing remaining in the morning. If anything did remain, it was to be burned.

**Represents:** Jesus Christ as perfect and sinless sacrifice for sins; the sweet experience of coming unto Him, as opposed to the bitterness of sin; the complete

> dedication required of those under covenant to God.



#### UNLEAVENED BREAD

Bread most likely made from emmer wheat, barley, or sorghum without leaven, which makes bread softer but also more susceptible to mold and other decay. In addition, leavened bread takes much longer to make, since the dough needs time to rise.

How it was used: Eaten for seven days. Leaven (which was probably some kind of sourdough starter) was to be removed from each home during this time.

**Represents:** Purity; haste of flight from captivity; Christ as the Bread of Life.

#### BLOOD ON LINTEL AND POSTS How it was

**used:** Hyssop (an herb later used in ritual

purifications) was dipped in the bowl of blood from the lamb, and then the blood was placed on the lintel and posts of the door.

**Represents:** A sign identifying God's covenant people; purification through Christ's blood, which was shed to atone for our sins.



#### LOINS GIRT, FEET SHOD, STAFF IN HAND, STANDING WHILE EATING

**Represents:** Readiness for hasty flight from captivity; desire for freedom





#### **OUR PASSOVER**

"Do we see [our weekly sacramental service] as our passover, remembrance of our safety and deliverance and redemption?

"With so very much at stake, this ordinance commemorating our escape from the angel of darkness should be taken more seriously than it sometimes is."

#### SIGNIFICANT PASSOVERS WITH THE SAVIOR



**1st Passover:** Purification of the temple ("Make not my Father's house an house of merchandise") see John 2:13–17.



**2nd Passover:** Miracle of the loaves and fishes ("I am the bread of life")—see John 6.



**3rd Passover:** Last Supper, introducing the sacrament ("This do in remembrance of me")—see Luke 22:7–20.



April 3, 1836: On Easter Sunday 1836, the second day of Passover, the Savior appeared to Joseph Smith and Oliver Cowdery in the Kirtland Temple and then priesthood keys were restored.

A heavenly voice, often the Father's voice, has testified at other times that Jesus Christ is the Son of God (see Matthew 3:17; 3 Nephi 11:7; Joseph Smith—History 1:17).

## TRY SOME NEW EASTER TRADITIONS



This Easter, spend some more time remembering the greatest gift ever given.

 hristmas usually gets the most attention when it comes to holidays. Yet without the long-ago events we celebrate each Easter,
 Christmas wouldn't exist.

President Gordon B. Hinckley (1910–2008) once taught, "There would be no Christmas if there had not been Easter. The babe Jesus of Bethlehem would be but another baby without the redeeming Christ of Gethsemane and Calvary, and the triumphant fact of the Resurrection."<sup>1</sup>

Here are a few traditions you might consider adding to your yearly celebrations.



#### **GO EASTER CAROLING**

Setting aside the whimsical versions about reindeer and elves, Christmas carols are all about Jesus Christ. Easter is the perfect time for music about the Savior, and yes, even when sung at the front doors of your neighbors.

If you're stuck for ideas, check out the "topics" section of the hymnbook under "Easter" and "Atonement" for songs. Any song celebrating Jesus Christ is a match for Easter caroling.



#### FORGIVE SOMEONE

How often have you been grateful for the gift of repentance? Easter offers a chance to put more thought into how we extend that same spirit of forgiveness to others.

Jesus taught: "Wherefore, I say unto you, that ye ought to forgive one another....

"I, the Lord, will forgive whom I will forgive, but of you it is required to forgive all men" (Doctrine and Covenants 64:9–10).

Ask yourself: Whom are you harboring bad feelings toward? Pray for strength to forgive this person, and let the Savior help those painful feelings disappear.



#### PUT ON A PLAY OR OTHER PERFORMANCE

You can arrange an Easter performance. A simple example might be a scriptural reading for family home evening or a community singalong concert.

Did you know that the materials for the musical *Savior of the World* are available on ChurchofJesusChrist.org?<sup>2</sup> You can download the script, the music, and even accompaniment tracks. The second act is ideal for Easter. You might even simply perform a single scene from the production.



#### VISIT GRAVES OF LOVED ONES

Because of Jesus Christ, death has lost its sting (see 1 Corinthians 15:55). Spend time visiting the graves of loved ones to ponder this great news.

You might even read out loud some favorite scriptures that deal with the Resurrection as you visit these graves. A few (of the *many*) scriptures to consider for this are 1 Corinthians 15:20–22; Alma 11:42–44; and Doctrine and Covenants 88:14–16.



#### **BE A LITTLE BETTER**

Easter honors the events of Gethsemane, what transpired on the cross, the Savior rising from the dead on the third day, and then His ministering for 40 days before ascending to heaven.

Additionally, not long after ascending to heaven, Jesus Christ appeared to the Nephites and ministered to them (see 3 Nephi 11–28). That's a lot to celebrate!

Why not expand your Easter season? Let your soul delight longer in the miracles of Easter. Make a conscious effort to be more Christlike during the 40 days after Easter. For inspiration, consider the following invitation from President Russell M. Nelson: "Consecrate a portion of your time each week to studying *everything* Jesus said and did as recorded in the Old Testament, for He is the Jehovah of the Old Testament. Study His laws as recorded in the New Testament, for He is its Christ. Study His doctrine as recorded in the Book of Mormon, for there is no book of scripture in which His mission and His ministry are more clearly revealed. And study His words as recorded in the Doctrine and Covenants, for He continues to teach His people in this dispensation." <sup>3</sup>

#### YOUR TRADITIONS ARE WAITING

Elder Dieter F. Uchtdorf of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles has taught, "To find the most important day in history, we must go back to that evening almost 2,000 years ago in the Garden of Gethsemane when Jesus Christ knelt in intense prayer and offered Himself as a ransom for our sins."<sup>4</sup>

The most important events in history are worth taking time to ponder each year. Traditions help us do that, whether the ones from this list or any of your own choosing.

## I WHL SEEHER AGAIN

Two scriptures provided hope in a time of sorrow.

ife gets crazy when you're a 17-year-old girl. High school crushes, geometry tests, weekend window-shopping at the mall, and late-night phone conversations all add up, along with the lifelong task of discovering who you really are.

My senior year in high school was quite an adventurous one. I sang in two choirs, performed with the high school dance company, participated in region and state drama, studied in Advanced Placement and college concurrentenrollment classes, and dated. I felt like a typical high school student.

But there was one exception—my mother was dying of Lou Gehrig's disease (ALS). The disease attacks the nervous system in the body. The brain sends messages to the muscles to move, but the disease prevents these messages from getting where they need to go. The result: a loss of the ability to move any muscles. It becomes difficult to eat, breathe, sit, stand, walk, talk, or do much of anything. It was so hard to see my mother experience this. We literally watched every muscle in her throat give out before she died.

She came home from the hospital on Mother's Day, and that night she asked my brother and me to sing "A Poor Wayfaring Man of Grief" (*Hymns*, no. 29). I made it through one verse and then collapsed in tears. The morning she died, we played a Mormon Tabernacle Choir CD. As she passed through the veil from one world to the next, the increasing emotion of the choir singing "The Spirit of God" (*Hymns*, no. 2) filled the room and accompanied our tears of grief and love. There were two scriptures in particular that helped me through this difficult and life-changing period. The first is found in Alma 40:23: "The soul shall be restored to the body, and the body to the soul; yea, and every limb and joint shall be restored to its body; yea, even a hair of the head shall not be lost; but all things shall be restored to their proper and perfect frame."

This scripture strengthened me because I knew that when I see my mother again, she won't have the weakened body she left this life with. She will be whole; she will be perfect.

She will be the mother I played with, prayed with, laughed with, and lived life with.

A friend sent me a card the day after my mother died, and inside was the second scripture: "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid" (John 14:27).

Ever since that trying period of my life, I've looked back on this scripture as a way to hold me up in times of trial, to keep me going in times of pain, and to comfort me in times of tears. This scripture touched my heart then and continues to do so today. **NE** *The author lives in Utah, USA*.

"Sunflowers are bright and pretty, so we felt they were a good way to represent Abby," explains Morgan S. 18.







Tanya Price (who the young women know today as the bishop's wife<sup>1</sup>) lost a baby at birth. The Prices named her Abby, and mourned as a member of their eternal family was laid to rest. Now, years later, at a Young Women in Excellence fireside in northern Utah, Bishop Jared Price spoke about his daughter.

"She would be your age now," he said. "She would be with you, working on projects you're working on, going to your meetings, joining you in prayer." He said he and his wife still missed Abby, even though they had known her for only a few hours in this life.

"When Bishop Price talked about his love for Abby, it made me realize, 'That's how my father feels about me,'" says Kayla F., 16. "It helped me love my own family even more, and realize how much Heavenly Father loves me."



"We wanted to show the Prices that we thought of Abby as one of us," says McKenna U., 14.

"Sometimes it was hard to keep it secret," says Jocelyn J., 13. "On Sundays, we would talk about our plans, but just in the Young Women room. If anyone asked, we told them we were doing Personal Progress."



"My values project was to improve a talent," says Hannah H., 15. "I had already done it for myself, but doing it again for Abby

#### EITHER SIDE OF THE VEIL

Earlier that same evening, one of the Young Women leaders, Danielle Jensen, had been praying to find an activity for the coming year that would bless the girls.

After hearing the bishop speak, Sister Jensen's husband, Tyce, suggested: Why not do the Personal Progress program on Abby's behalf, then surprise Bishop and Sister Price with the results? Sister Jensen talked to the other leaders and the girls, and The Abby Price Project— AP Project, for short—was underway.







Sophia A, 18: "In this case, ministering was about loving someone we'd never met. As the project went on, we all felt our love grow—for Abby, her family, and each other. That's what ministering is about, loving other people, being part of something bigger than yourself."



Shyleigh D., 17: "For Personal Progress, I read the Book of Mormon. It inspired me to stand up for what's right, like Nephi did. My friend is autistic, and some other kids were bullying him. I told them to stop, and they left. Then I told my friend we should read scriptures together, and we did. He ended up taking seminary with me."

made me think about what kinds of talents she has and what she might be doing with them in heaven."

"It was interesting reading the Book of Mormon for someone else," Morgan S., 18, says. "Sometimes I would read a scripture out loud, to share it with Abby and think about what it would mean to her."

"I think it was neat that when we worked on the AP Project, we couldn't count it for ourselves," says Sidney B., 16. "We got to feel Abby's spirit, and when we were done we got to write in the journal how we felt about her and her family."

"It kept us thinking about someone else," says Hallie C., 13. On Abby's birthday, the young women decorated her grave with sunflowers and balloons, and cleaned and decorated other graves nearby.

"When President [Russell M.] Nelson invited teens to join the youth battalion, it was like we were already prepared to join," says another Abby, Abby E., 14.

Olivia A., 14, agrees. "When we minister to others, we feel the Savior's love and they do, too."



#### **9** WAYS TO MINISTER

Here are some things the young women did for the AP Project. Maybe you can use them as inspiration for your own ministering.

- 1. Cleaned and decorated graves at the local cemetery.
- 2. Braided bracelets for an organization that supports parents who have lost a child.
- 3. Gathered used clothing and took it to a center that helps those in need.
- **4.** Wrote letters of encouragement to missionaries.
- 5. Made and delivered greeting cards with happy messages to cheer people up.
- 6. Cleaned a widow's yard and garden.
- 7. Put on a talent show at an assisted living center.
- 8. Fasted for a friend who was injured.
- Observed good qualities in others and then told them what was admired.



"Sunflowers became the symbol for the AP Project," Britten M., 15 explains. "The leaders gave each of us a sunflower charm bracelet to remind us of Abby and of service." Many of the girls still wear the bracelets every day.



"And sunflowers are drawn to the light," says Emma E., 16. "So they remind us young women and daughters of God to find spiritual light."









"When we went to the temple and did baptisms for the dead, we did something for them that they can't do for themselves," says Stephanie S., 18. "The AP Project let us do something like that for Abby, something she couldn't do for herself."

"I never thought about the other side of the veil before as much as I did when we did our service for Abby," says Britten M., 15. "I think we were all more motivated to learn about our ancestors."

"They need us because they don't have physical bodies to receive ordinances," says Emma E., 16. "Helping them is part of gathering Israel, another thing President Nelson said to do."



When a year had passed and the annual Young Women in Excellence night arrived again, the Prices came, eager to support the young women. Then, as each young woman summarized her achievements, she also told what she had done on behalf of Abby.

"We were overwhelmed that they had done so much for our daughter," Sister Price recalls.

"They were filled with love for us, and we were filled with love for them," says Bishop Price.

Since then, Bishop and Sister Price have read and re-read the words of love and encouragement in Abby's Personal Progress journal many times.

Not long ago, the young women visited the Prices. They delivered a vase of sunflowers. They laughed, teased each other, and ate brownies. Then the young women went once again to the cemetery to visit the grave of their friend.

"Someday, we'll get to meet Abby Price," Sister Jensen says. "We'll give her a hug and let her know that we loved ministering to her and her family. It was a blessing to us all." **NE**
