JOY IS WITHIN YOUR REACH

When we have the Spirit, we rejoice in what the Savior has done for us.

he chorus of one of my favorite hymns entreats, "Lift up your heart! Lift up your voice! Rejoice, again I say, rejoice!" ("Rejoice, the Lord Is King!" *Hymns*, no. 66). The text of the hymn is taken from Paul's writings to the Philippians: "Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice" (Philippians 4:4). The dictionary defines *rejoice* as "to feel joy or great delight." 1

The source of the kind of joy which causes us to rejoice is an understanding of the plan of salvation.

Joy comes when we have the Spirit in our lives (see Alma 22:15). When we have the Spirit, we rejoice in what the Savior has done for us.

How to Have Joy

What do we need to do to have this kind of joy? In addition to attaining saving ordinances and following the living prophet, we need to live in accordance with certain fundamental spiritual principles, such as prayer, scripture study, righteous living, and service to others. It is well understood that if we engage in sinful conduct, we must repent. Let me suggest three other areas or distractions we need to avoid in order to maintain joy and rejoice more fully in the Savior's gift: (1) avoid distractions which keep us from doing what we ought to do, (2) avoid the magnification of small imperfections, and (3) avoid unfavorable comparisons with others.

Avoiding Distractions

We are often unaware of the distractions which push us in a material direction and keep us from a Christ-centered focus. In essence we let celestial goals get side-tracked by telestial distractions. In our family we call these telestial distractions "Saturday Morning Cartoons." Let me explain.

When our son, Larry, was five years old, I asked him what he wanted to be when he grew up. He said he wanted to be a doctor like his Uncle Joe. Larry had experienced a serious operation and had acquired great respect for doctors, especially his Uncle Joe. I proceeded to tell Larry how all the worthwhile things he was doing would help prepare him to be a doctor.

Several months later, I asked him again what he would like to be. This time he said he wanted to be an airline pilot. Changing the goal was fine, so I proceeded to explain how his various activities would help him achieve this goal. Almost as an afterthought I said, "Larry, last time we talked you wanted to be a doctor. What has changed your mind?" He answered, "I still like the idea of being a doctor, but I have noticed that Uncle Joe works on Saturday mornings, and I wouldn't want to miss Saturday Morning Cartoons."

Since that time our family has labeled a distraction from a worthwhile goal as a Saturday Morning Cartoon.

What are some of the Saturday Morning Cartoons that distract us from attaining the joy that we desire? Some want to be married in the temple but only date those who do not qualify for a recommend. Others want to be a good home teacher or visiting teacher but are distracted by the constant parade of TV programs, catalogs, and other material maintenance and don't find time to minister to those they are assigned to teach. Still others want to have family prayer but allow little matters to build into discord that make it harder for the family to kneel together. If we examine the reasons we don't do what we ought to do, we find that the list of Saturday Morning Cartoons is almost endless.

The greatest gift to all mankind is the Atonement of Jesus Christ. If we are to rejoice in this gift, we need to avoid the Saturday Morning Cartoons of life which distract our focus from the Savior and the celestial goal for which we strive.



Don't Focus on Your Imperfections

A second group who do not find joy are distracted by magnifying small areas of imperfection so as to drive out happiness. Some have allowed their own perceptions of imperfection to cloud the reality of their lives. An objective outsider observing them would conclude that they should be joyful. But they do not feel to rejoice. They are like the couple who have been invited to visit a beautiful garden. Instead of celebrating the visual feast, they see only the few wilted flowers and weeds and the relatively small areas which are not beautiful to behold. They do not feel the garden meets their expectations. In like manner, they are unduly critical of themselves and of others. They have become accustomed to exaggerating small imperfections and underestimating great blessings and have lost the capacity to rejoice.

The Savior in Luke mildly cautioned Martha about this approach when she complained that her sister Mary was spending too much time listening to the Savior instead of serving temporal needs. He said, "Martha, Martha, thou art . . . troubled about many things" (Luke 10:41). The Savior then indicated that Mary was focused on what really mattered.

Don't Compare Yourselves

A third area of distraction that can destroy joy is comparing our talents and blessings with others. The growth in our own talents is the best measure of personal progress. In recent years the concept of "personal best" has become widely accepted. This has great merit. Remember we usually judge others



at their best and ourselves at our worst. In the parable of the talents, the servants who received five talents and two talents were praised by the Lord for increasing their talents and told to "enter thou into the joy of thy lord." The servant who was rebuked was the servant who buried the talent given him. (See Matthew 25:14–30.) Comparing blessings is almost certain to drive out joy. We cannot be grateful and envious at the same time. If we truly want to have the Spirit of the Lord and experience joy and happiness, we should rejoice in our blessings and be grateful. We should especially rejoice in the blessings that are available through the temple.

Let us avoid the Saturday Morning Cartoons of life, particularly those that would keep us from the temple. Let us rejoice in the promise that is ours through the Atonement of the Savior and through Christlike living adhere to the counsel of the Psalmist: "This is the day which the Lord hath made; we will rejoice and be glad in it" (Psalm 118:24). NE

What gifts do you have that your siblings, parents, or grandparents have too? Go further! Research family history, discover stories, and identify even more gifts you share with your family.


9. Receive and study your patriarchal blessing.

hen I was 12 years old, my father was in the bishopric. There were benefits, such as being able to give my tithing to my father, but there were also some unexpected downsides. For example, people expected more of me. And there was another downside that was much more treacherous.

Three years later, I was at my first speech and debate meet. I confidently gave a persuasive and powerful speech convincing people to vote for me.

God knows us. He knows our weaknesses and he knows our strengths. I know that the promise in Ether is true: If we simply believe, and act on that belief, God will turn our weakness into strength (see Ether 12:27). NE



magine the deepest, darkest forest you can think of. We're talking centuries-old, gnarled trees covered in thick moss. All but the thinnest rays of sunlight would be blocked by the dense canopy of branches above. The forest floor would remain so hidden in such tangled undergrowth that there's no chance of seeing a trail.

Can you picture it?

Now pretend this foreboding forest stretches for miles on end and you need to find your way through—alone—without compass, guide, map, or trail.

Does *life* ever feel like that? In particular, does your spiritual journey back to God ever feel like that?

You Matter

The adversary wants you to believe that you're utterly unimportant. Invisible. Not worth anyone's time or attention, and certainly not worth anything to God. You're just another piece of brush hidden in a huge, dense, dark forest.

Nothing could be further from the truth.

President Dieter F. Uchtdorf, Second Counselor in the First Presidency, has taught, "While we may look at the vast expanse of the universe and say, 'What is man in comparison to the glory of creation?' God Himself said we are the reason He created the universe! . . . This is a paradox of man: compared to God, man is nothing; yet we are everything to God."

Everything! Can you imagine?

Life's journey might feel at times like a walk through the darkness and tangles of dense woods,

You Back

but you're never alone and you're certainly never without access to help. God is your Father. He loves you. He wants you back.

He Gave Us Everything We Need

Just ponder for a moment on all that God has given us. When you were baptized, you received the gift of the Holy Ghost. Each week in sacrament we hear the phrase, "that they may *always* have his Spirit to be with them" (D&C 20:77, emphasis added).

President Henry B. Eyring, First Counselor in the First Presidency, has taught, "To always have the Spirit with us is to have the guidance and direction of the Holy Ghost in our daily lives."²

When you leave the house each day, remember that promise!

God has also given us prophets, apostles, and other leaders whose words blast through the false teachings of the world and inspire us with truth and hope.

Think of the specific people God has placed in your life. Remember the countless times when somebody showed up exactly when you needed a helping hand or a kind word, comforting you when you were down or making you laugh when laughter seemed impossible. Those tender mercies aren't coincidences. They're evidence of your Father helping you along the path back.³

He has created a plan to bring you home and is willing to "*lead thee by the hand*" (D&C 112:10). Our job is to take His hand and press forward.

What Is Our Part?

Sometimes you may hear motivational speakers, athletic trainers, and advertisers try to pump you up by

conjuring images of strapping on shoes, leaping out of bed before dawn, and tackling the world with nothing but our grit and determination. And certainly there will be times when digging down deep will be necessary to press forward through the challenges of life.

However, notice that the 2016 Mutual theme doesn't just say "press forward." Rather, we need to "press forward with a steadfastness in Christ" (2 Nephi 31:20).

On our own we simply can't make it. It's only as we follow Christ, rely on Christ, and commit to Christ that we can find strength and success in our journey.

One Step at a Time

When we recognize all that God does to help us, when we understand how much He wants us to return to live with Him, and as we press forward and center our lives in Christ, we have all we need. We can successfully pass through the roughest stretches this life has to offer.

"Wherefore, if ye shall press forward, feasting upon the word of Christ, and endure to the end, behold, thus saith the Father: Ye shall have eternal life" (2 Nephi 31:20).

If your journey ever feels like one wrong turn after another through dark and twisted trees, know now that the way through is always available to you.

Simply turn to God, let Him lead you, and press

Have you grown closer to Jesus Christ just by doing those regular things?

Yes, definitely. I feel so much closer to Him than I have before, because I talk to Heavenly Father in His name every day. I've gained that relationship, just like a regular friend.

What was one experience you had on the show that illustrates how you had to live your faith?

There was one time where a group of teenagers wanted to go to a party and I thought, "Oh fun! Dancing and stuff!" But then I realized what they meant by it—drinking and stuff—and I felt sick to my stomach, because I'd already committed to going. What could I say? I really struggled with that. And it's cool, because I actually just had a really close friend who found it really cool that I did that. He asked me a lot more about the Church, and he actually got baptized this last summer! That's awesome! Any last thoughts?

Hopefully the youth will feel the spirit of this song and realize everyone's worth. I want them to know just how much Heavenly Father loves them and of how much worth they are to Him. SPIRING My SPIRING MY CONFIDE



I KNEW THE CHURCH WAS TRUE, BUT ON A SCALE OF 1 TO 10, MY SPIRITUAL CONFIDENCE WAS AT A -50. WHAT HAD HAPPENED?

can't remember the exact day I crumbled, but I do remember how I felt. I was sitting in seminary. For some reason, I didn't want to raise my hand to answer a question. Pretty soon, I didn't feel I knew the answers, whether in seminary, Sunday school, or Young Women meetings. Suddenly, I had no confidence in my knowledge of the gospel.

I still knew the Church was true, but I felt I was doing something wrong. I judged myself harshly and didn't feel worthy to pray. I started to panic. I felt horrible inside, all the time. It was like I was sick and hadn't the slightest idea what the cure was, because I didn't know what was wrong. I hadn't committed any serious sin or transgression, and my

senior year of high school had started off really great. So what in the world was the matter with me?

These feelings continued for a couple of months, and before I knew it, it was time for October 2014 general conference. I was looking forward to my mother's October conference chili with corn chips, but my mind was all over the place. One of my teachers at church had challenged us to write out questions we were seeking answers for and to then listen for the answers in conference. Ten minutes before the Saturday morning session was to begin, I finally sat down with my computer and started typing up questions I had. I still felt sick and still didn't know why.

Conference began, and just as I had for the previous few years, I paid attention to the speakers and took notes, but I still didn't know what I was looking for.


During the hymn halfway through the Saturday afternoon session, Mom got the chili out and Dad and I got up to fill our bowls, pile on the corn chips, and get back to the couch before the song ended. For some reason I was hesitant to get up, but I was hungry. In the kitchen, as I contemplated the right chili-to-corn chip ratio, I felt like I needed to go back. I quickly grabbed a bowl and was about to get a spoon when I felt as though the Holy Ghost jolted me and said, "Sit down on the couch." I dropped my bowl on the counter and got to the couch in two strides. I pulled my laptop onto my lap just as Elder Klebingat began speaking.

His first sentence: "On a scale of 1 to 10, how would you rate your spiritual confidence before God?"1

My jaw dropped. Elder Klebingat was through the first paragraph of his talk before I actually digested the fact

> needed to hear. Stunned, I vigorously began typing notes on my computer. Elder Klebingat had accurately diagnosed me: my spiritual confidence

was a -50. Then he proceeded to prescribe a cure for my sickness.

The Lord was the only one who knew what I needed, and He was the only one who knew when Elder Klebingat would be speaking (at the precise moment my corn chips would be calling to me). I am so glad I sat down and listened.

So, now that I was on the road to recovering my spiritual confidence, I had a new question: why had my spiritual confidence crumbled in the first place? I had seen a teaser on a website about how a dark chapter in my nation became a time to reinvent itself. How can a dark time bring about rejuvenation? It seemed a little paradoxical, but it brought to mind a scripture from Ether 12:27: "And if men come unto me I will show unto them their weakness. I give unto men weakness that they may be humble; and my grace is sufficient for all men that humble themselves before me; for if they humble themselves before me, and have faith in

me, then will I make weak things become strong unto them."

Hmm. "Weak things become strong." OK, I'm seeing a pattern here.

I hadn't seen this time of spiritual panic coming. I had been scared and hadn't known what was going on or how to fix it. But because of Elder Klebingat's diagnosis and prescribed cure, I now study my scriptures for 30 minutes every day. I am expanding my knowledge of the Savior's Atonement, and I see trials and challenges in a completely different light. As Elder Klebingat said in his talk:

"When these trials come, the adversary's minions begin broadcasting that you did something wrong, that this is a punishment, a sign that Heavenly Father does not love you. Ignore that! Instead, try to force a smile, gaze heavenward, and say, 'I understand, Lord. I know what this is. A time to prove myself, isn't it?' Then partner with Him to endure well to the end. Spiritual confidence increases when you accept that often trials and tribulations are allowed to come into [your life] because of what [you] are doing right."²

Before this experience I felt like I knew the gospel. But now I realize that I understand that this gospel is true because I have tested it. I have trusted it. And by so doing, I opened my heart to Heavenly Father. He has kept His promises: He has "manifest[ed] the truth of it unto [me] by the power of the Holy Ghost" (Moroni 10:4). I know Heavenly Father has a plan for me. I know He has a plan for you. Don't be afraid to find out what it is. **NE**



tudying abroad had always been a dream of mine, so when the opportunity came to study Spanish in Chile, I packed up my bags and flew 12 hours to stay with a Chilean family and attend school there. Morgan,* a girl I met in Chile, was also in the same Spanish program and the only

other member of the Church I knew. We instantly became good friends and made plans to attend church the following Sunday morning.

I set my alarm for 8:30 a.m. that Sunday and texted Morgan to make sure she was awake. I started getting ready for church, but even as 9:00 rolled around, I hadn't heard from Morgan. My heart slowly sank. I sat on my bed and thought, do I go alone? I felt scared. I was in a place I barely knew, I spoke minimal Spanish, I didn't know anyone who would be at church, and I would have to walk eight blocks in cold rain. To make matters even harder, my Chilean family wasn't LDS, and they were still asleep.

Once 9:30 passed, I figured I wasn't going to hear from Morgan after all. But I still felt too nervous to go by myself.

10 o'clock came—the time church started—and by now I was sitting on

my bed, having changed back into my pajama pants to keep me warm from the Chilean winter air. Not knowing what else to do—and wanting to feel the Spirit—I pulled out my laptop to watch *Mormon Messages* videos.

I was really touched by the second one I watched: "Dare to Stand Alone," with a story from President Thomas S. Monson.

In this short clip, President Monson described his experience at Navy boot camp. On his first Sunday afternoon there, the chief petty officer directed them where to attend their churches. He sent the Catholics to one building, the Jews to another, and the Protestants to yet another. President Monson didn't know where to go, since he was not any of those religions, so he just stood his ground feeling completely alone. "Courageous and determined, yes—but alone." he said.

The officer came up to him and asked, "And just what do you guys call yourselves?" It wasn't until then that President Monson realized there were other men behind him. Almost in unison they said, "Mormons, sir!"

As I saw that, I realized I wasn't being courageous enough to dare to stand alone.

I was afraid to go to church because I was by myself. As that realization sank in, I threw on my skirt and ate a speedy breakfast. I pulled on my yellow rain boots, packed my church shoes in my purse, and marched off to church just like President Monson. The whole time I walked to church, I wondered how I was brave enough to travel 5,728 miles away from my family and friends, live with a foreign family, speak a foreign language, and yet not be brave enough to walk eight blocks alone to church.

Going to church in Chile was an incredible experience. The members

took me under their wing from the very first day, making sure I felt welcomed and loved. They were so kind and found ways to include me in their lives, including teaching me how to make Chilean dishes and inviting me to clean the church with them on a Saturday morning.



ou can get through a lot in life by figuring things out as you go along. Whether that means blissfully ignoring written instructions on how to assemble furniture that came in a million pieces or teaching yourself to play a musical instrument by pounding out whatever notes sound the best, your capacity to learn through trial and error is practically unlimited.

Only thing is, it's usually not very easy that way.

Imagine something truly complicated. What if you were in charge of building your own home and had all the raw materials set out in front of you. Can you picture that huge pile of stuff? Boards, nails, pipes, wires, tools, and everything else you'd need to build an awesome house for you and your family.

Would you still want to make it up as you went along? Or would you want help from somebody who actually knows how to make the most of the materials?

Our path through life is the same way. We all need help building our lives. And there's no better builder to turn to than God.

than you've ever imagined.

As explained in *For the Strength of Youth:* "The Lord will make much more out of your life than you can by yourself. He will increase your opportunities, expand your vision, and strengthen you. He will give you the help you need to meet your trials and challenges. You will gain a stronger testimony and find true joy as you come to know your Father in Heaven and His Son, Jesus Christ, and feel Their love for you" ([2011], 43).

When we obey God's commandments and involve Him in our plans, we become who we need to become—not who we thought we wanted to be.

Here are a few people who, with God's help, found a better path than the one they had picked for themselves.

LETTING GO OF VIOLENCE

In a video series on mormonchannel.org, a young man named Bubba shares his story about how his life was headed for disaster. He had grown up in a violent home, where his father was murdered when Bubba was only three years old.

Bubba grew up choosing the same life he'd always seen. He joined a gang and started fights with anybody who crossed him. By high school he figured he would end up in prison before long. And he didn't care.


God intervened. At this dangerous crossroads in his life, Bubba met a Latter-day Saint family who showed him loving kindness and goodness. He'd never been around people like this before—people who showed compassion and love. He started spending as much time with them as possible. When he asked the family why they acted the way they did, they said it was because of their faith in Jesus Christ.

He wanted to find out what they knew. He began praying and studying the scriptures. And soon he felt something he'd never felt before. "Surely there is a God, and He loves

me!" Bubba says. With God's help, Bubba began to build his life over again with Jesus Christ as the foundation, leaving his old life behind.

"My nature changed. Who I am as a human being is different than who I was. Now I have a purpose. I have a destiny," he says. "I have somewhere that I'm going."

These days Bubba sees his future with brightness, faith, and hope. "I know that it is only through Jesus Christ, my faith in Him, that will help me get to where I want to get to," he says.²

CHANGING DIRECTION

President Hugh B. Brown (1883–1975), a member of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles and of the First Presidency, shared an experience where God made more out of his life than he would have done on his own.

Hugh had been serving in the Canadian military and was in line to be promoted to general. He had been working, hoping, and praying for that promotion for 10 years.

When the position became available, however, he was passed over simply because he was a member of the Church. That was literally the only reason, and they told him so.

Hugh was furious. He said: "I got on the train and started back . . . with a broken heart, with bitterness in my soul. . . . When I got to my tent, . . . I threw my cap . . . on the cot. I clenched my fists, and I shook them at heaven. I said, 'How could you do this to me, God? I have done everything I could do to measure up. There is nothing that I could have done—that I should have done—that I haven't done. How could you do this to me?' I was as bitter as gall."³

Then Hugh remembered an experience from years earlier. He'd once bought a neglected farm that had an overgrown currant bush. Without trimming, that bush would never provide fruit. All it wanted to do was grow taller.

So Hugh trimmed it back severely. Afterward, he saw little drops of liquid at the end of each cut branch. They looked like tears. "I am the gardener here," he told the currant bush. Hugh knew what he wanted that bush to become, and it wasn't a shade tree.

That experience came to his mind as he battled anger over being passed up for promotion. "I heard a voice, and I recognized the tone of this voice. It was my own voice, and the voice said, 'I am the gardener here. I know what I want you to do.' The bitterness went out of my soul, and I fell on my knees by the cot to ask forgiveness for my ungratefulness. . . .



"I AM THE GARDENER HERE. I KNOW WHAT I WANT YOU TO DO."

"... And now, almost 50 years later, I look up to [God] and say, "Thank you, Mr. Gardener, for cutting me down, for loving me enough to hurt me." ⁴

Hugh never became a general. The Lord had other plans for President Brown. With the Lord as his architect, President Brown's life became a masterful structure.

BUILDING FROM SCRATCH

Being called a "child of hell" by a prophet of God probably doesn't sound like your life's headed in a good direction. But that's exactly what happened to Zeezrom, a lawyer in the Book of Mormon. (See Alma 11:23.)

Alma and Amulek were preaching in the land where Zeezrom was trying to gain money as a lawyer by stirring up the people against Alma and Amulek. Zeezrom tried to trick Alma and Amulek with his questions, but they answered and rebuked him. Zeezrom's thoughts were revealed to them by the Spirit. (See Alma 11–12.)

As the conversation continued, Zeezrom was stunned into silence. He began to recognize his faults and felt

serious guilt over his sins and what he'd done to lead the people away. He soon tried to undo some of the damage he'd caused, saying, "Behold, I am guilty, and these men are spotless before God" (Alma 14:7).

But it didn't work. The people cast Zeezrom out of their city. His guilt and despair over what he'd done—including a mistaken fear that his preaching against Alma and Amulek had led to their death—caused Zeezrom to fall sick with fever, "scorched with a burning heat" (Alma 15:3).


The structure he'd built for his life had crumbled to its foundation. But that's not where Zeezrom's story ends.

Once he learned that Alma and Amulek were still alive, Zeezrom took courage and asked for them to come to him. When they did, Zeezrom asked to be healed. Through his faith Zeezrom was healed fully. He was then baptized and began to preach from that time forth (see Alma 15:11–12).

Zeezrom's new life, this time with God as his architect, had just begun.

BEYOND HAMMER AND NAIL

The good news is we were never meant to go through life alone. God wants to help us every step of the way. And when we let Him help, there's no limit to what we can become. **NE**



TEMPORAL VS. ETERNAL

In this life we have many opportunities to use our agency. All social networks, popularity, and friends may seem pretty important in this life, but in the end it is the kingdom of God that will matter. There's a quote I love that Elder Neal A. Maxwell (1926-2004) of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles said in general conference: "If you have not chosen the kingdom of God first, it will in the end make no difference what you have chosen instead." 5

Sometimes we are so focused in this life, we forget what is most important. If we could take the veil away from us, our whole perspective would change. We would become more humble and give more importance to the Lord and not so much importance to man.

I am convinced I want to be righteous and follow God. I want to have an eternal perspective, so I can enter His mighty kingdom. This will be better than having all the money and power of the world. In this life we shall live for only a short period in comparison to the eternities. The glory we will receive will be the glory we will have forever.

YOURSELF"

An Apostle's unexpected advice helped me know how I should prepare to serve a mission.

ver since I was young, I knew I wanted to serve a mission. And when I opened my mission call, I felt the Spirit stronger than I ever had before.

During the time I was preparing to receive my mission call, I had the opportunity to attend a devotional where Elder David A. Bednar of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles spoke to a group of youth and young single adults. I had no idea that he'd be coming, and when I saw him, I couldn't wait to hear what he had to say. He said he wanted to have a question-and-answer session. And when he asked for questions, I jumped at the opportunity.

"What is the most important thing I can do to prepare to be an effective missionary?" I asked.

He looked right at me and said, "Get over yourself." At first I was taken aback. I had to think twice to make sure I hadn't said something wrong, thinking maybe I was being scolded a little.

But then he explained that serving a mission is not about me; instead, it's about serving the Lord and completely losing myself in that service. This advice completely changed my missionary preparation and my outlook on missionary service.

For future missionaries, including me, it can be easy to become prideful and say, "I can't wait to baptize lots of people." But this isn't a good mind-set to have. Instead, it would be better to say, "I can't wait to serve the Lord. I will do what He wants me to do

because I'm serving Him and He is giving me a chance to participate in His work." It's all about getting over yourself and serving others.

Since Elder Bednar gave me that advice, I've thought about it every day. If I'm ever tempted to not read my scriptures because I'm too tired, I imagine Elder Bednar saying, "Get over yourself." While it would be nice to get some extra sleep, studying the scriptures is something that Heavenly Father wants me to do every day. Besides, it's not about me; it's about serving Him.

I've also started putting more effort into my scripture study since I received this advice. My goal is to not just read them, but also to understand them so I'll be more prepared for my mission. Now when I read my scriptures, I take out my journal and write down a question. As I read, I look for answers to that question and write those answers down. One time I wrote down the question, "What are the traits of an effective missionary?" As I studied the scriptures, I learned about traits I can develop as I prepare for my mission.

I can't wait to serve a mission. I'm excited to lose myself in missionary service as an instrument in God's hands. It's a chance to just focus on the Lord and His people. It's not about me. It's about doing all of the small and simple things the Lord wants me to do. NE

FORGET YOURSELF

"Those first few weeks [of my mission], because of illness and the opposition which we felt. I was discouraged. I wrote a letter home to my good father and said that I felt I was wasting my time and his money.... He was a wise and inspired man. He wrote a very short letter to me which said, 'Dear Gordon, I have your recent letter. I have only one suggestion: forget yourself and go to work.' Earlier that morning in our scripture class my companion and I had read these words of the Lord: 'Whosoever will save his life shall lose it: but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the gospel's, the same shall save it.' (Mark 8:35.)

"Those words of the Master, followed by my father's letter with his counsel to forget myself and go to work, went into my very being. With my father's letter in hand, I went into our bedroom ... and got on my knees and made a pledge with the Lord. I covenanted that I would try to forget myself and lose myself in His service."

MATERIALS NEEDED

ver noticed how President Thomas S. Monson seems to remember the tiniest details from his life? When he shares a childhood story it's like it happened yesterday.

Well, in general conference President Monson mentioned one of his tricks of the trade. Before sharing some personal stories about prayer, he said, "My daily journal, kept over all these years, has helped provide some specifics which I most likely would not otherwise be able to recount."

Capturing memories preserves them forever. But if we rely on our minds alone? They vanish like smoke.

Object lesson time!





LIGHT THE CANDLE.

Discuss something awesome you and your family have done together lately. This could be anything from going to the temple to playing laser tag. Tell your family that the flame represents this activity. Talk through as many details as you can remember.

Disclaimer: This activity involves fire, which can potentially be hazardous. Find an adult to help you before doing this experiment. (Also, remember that open flames or lighted candles can't be used in Church buildings.)



Watch the thinning smoke. What does it make you think of? In this lesson, the vanishing smoke trail represents the details of your family event being lost over time. (Sniff. So sad.) But hey, no long faces. You're only getting started.

RE-LIGHT THE CANDLE (the good stuff is right around the corner).
Tell your family that you're winding back the clock. The flame represents the same family memory as before.

only, this time you've got something special up your sleeve. Get your original flame source (match or lighter) up and running. Then snuff the candle by blowing straight down on the flame, and subsequently blow minds with what you do next.



Hold the flame source directly in the smoke trail. If you blew down on the flame, the smoke trail should rise straight up. When the flame touches the smoke, a tiny spark travels down the trail and lights the candle all over again! Rest assured it's a crowd pleaser. This tiny bit of pyrotechnic prowess can be compared to capturing your family activity through journaling or other techniques. By recording events, you form a powerful link right back to the occasion and have access to crystal clear memories even decades later. The vanishing smoke of memory becomes a strong flame once more.

MEMORIES MATTER

Some final food for thought. Who doesn't love the inspiring account of Samuel the Lamanite as he preached to the wicked Nephites? The thing is, the fulfillment of one of his prophecies was not written down. It might've been lost forever. However, when the Savior visited the Americas, He commanded the people to record what they had missed (see 3 Nephi 23:6–13).

You fit right into this pattern. "Our service and personal ministry are not limited to the living on this earth," said Elder Hugo E. Martinez of the Seventy. "We can also keep a journal and write our family histories to turn the hearts of the living toward the living—as

well as the hearts of the living toward their ancestors."²

Capturing the blow-by-blow account of an especially epic snowball fight with your family may create a bond with great-great-great grandchildren you'll never meet. Cool! Consider, too, that describing in a journal how you found strength during a trial or gained testimony about a gospel truth might just be the answer to a prayer that won't be uttered for another 100 years.

So, preserve your precious memories. They'll burn brightly forever. **NE**

His dreams were about to come true.
There was just one thing...

t all started with a joke: "You guys should make a commercial. They make millions!"

Joseph Sim of Alberta, Canada, had been chatting with his friend about how to save money for their missions when his friend's dad joked that they ought to try their skills behind a camera and strike it rich.

The idea stuck, if only for the adventure factor. They began working together to create a fake commercial even though they didn't expect fame or fortune to knock on their door anytime soon. The two friends started a YouTube channel and began uploading funny videos that were all about their quest of finding a way to make a commercial.

Things kind of snowballed from there.

An unexpected offer

While they were living it up creating the short videos, Joseph realized quickly how much he loved the art. He wanted to do more. "I had found my passion for filmmaking and started an LDS film group with my friends," he said.

Those first videos from the LDS film group were goofy and funny shorts about Mormon culture, boasting such titles as "Stuff Mormons Say."

After the new videos began gaining an audience Joseph decided to step up his game. He launched a web series about an ambitious young filmmaker looking for his break. These new comedy videos started getting more attention than ever before—so much attention, in fact, that the web series caught the eye of a major Canadian restaurant chain who wanted to partner with Joseph.



through the storyline. Joseph couldn't believe his luck. "In my mind, this was the chance, the break," he said. "I knew film production was where I wanted to end up."

The restaurant chain liked his material so much they offered to re-shoot the existing four episodes he'd already finished. That meant better cameras and equipment, a budget, the works. Fame and fortune came a-knockin' after all.

But then came the catch.

The big question

"They wanted to change the material," Joseph said. "They wanted to taint the humor with sexual references and immoral situations."

Joseph began feeling uneasy as soon as they started telling him their vision of reshaping his web series into something other than the clean material he'd created. They had a specific bar-and-grill type audience in mind and wanted the videos to appeal to that group. "Are you with us?" they asked.

Joseph's head was spinning. "They had everything I thought I wanted," he said. "But then I was reminded of a scripture, 3 Nephi 13:24: 'No man can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or else he will hold to the one and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and Mammon.' I knew there was no middle path. This was a simple choice."

A simple choice, maybe, but not easy in the moment. "I felt panicked, worried, and scared I'd be left with regret," he said. "But when I did in fact decline their

offer, I felt total reassurance that I had made the right choice."

They parted ways. The deal was off.

Looking back

Fast-forward a couple years since that big decision. Joseph Sim is now Elder Sim of the England Leeds Mission. He still hopes to pursue film in the future, but he doesn't regret in the slightest having turned down the offer.

"At the time I'm pretty sure I thought the earth itself would shatter in two," he says. "But with a bit of hindsight, I'm fairly confident I simply stood in front of something all of us have faced: the crossroads of the world and the gospel. I'm also confident that this crossroads is a daily thing, not some milestone event in our lives. We're constantly making the decision between convenience and covenants."

Even though the web video deal didn't go through, Elder Sim still learned a ton from his time behind the camera. A lot of which helps him as a missionary.

"I've noticed that a major key to success in filmmaking and missionary work is creativity, anything that makes us unique," he said. "We spend so much time worrying about what other people will think and trying to be someone else that the world ends up missing out on us altogether."


No matter who you are, your life's a story in the making. Make sure you tell a good one. NE

The best things to do in that situation are:
(1) be kind, loving, and accepting of your friend and (2) never waver in your testimony.

If you do these things, your friend will hopefully feel your love and acceptance and want to be around you. Also, he'll hopefully see that ridicule and mockery are ugly things and that anyone worthy of his admiration and friendship wouldn't attack another person's beliefs in that way.

Your example can be one of the best things your friend can have. Be like those people from Lehi's dream who partook of the fruit of the tree of life and were mocked by those in the great and spacious building but "heeded them not" (1 Nephi 8:33). If your friend sees you upholding your beliefs and standing up to others' mockery with dignity, respect, and good humor, he may see that it's possible for him to do the same. If there's still a seed of testimony in his heart, the example you set and the testimony you bear may be some of the things that help him feel the Spirit and remember what he once knew. **NE**



HOW TO PRESS FORWARD

ress forward implies something more than simply going forward. Press implies something is preventing your advancement, and you must push through it. To go forward in this life, you must press temptations aside, press through obstacles, press the doubt and the fear under your feet, and embrace the divine qualities of faith, hope, and love.

How do you press forward? Nephi answers, "Ye must press forward with a steadfastness in Christ, having a perfect brightness of hope, and a love of God and of all men" (2 Nephi 31:20).

Pressing forward with steadfastness in Christ means having faith in Him. It means making Him the central focus of your thoughts and actions. When it is He you are following, pressing forward is the ultimate adventure.

Pressing forward means pushing away the "temptations and cares" of the world and keeping the commandments with exactness. "If ye love me," Jesus said, "keep my commandments" (John 14:15).

Nephi adds that with our steadfastness in Christ comes a perfect brightness of hope and a love of God and all men. Hope smiles brightly before us. We find peace even in difficulties. Discipleship allows us to see our true purposes on the earth. Those purposes center in helping our family, those we love. and those around us. They include building the kingdom of God, and as we do, we become who we should become.

Nephi tells us that we must press forward, feasting upon the words of Christ. He tells us that with the gift of the Holy Ghost, we can speak with (and understand) the tongue of angels (see 2 Nephi 32:2-5). I know this voice. It is a voice we must continually be ready to hear.
