
HOW THE RESTORATION OF THE AARONIC PRIESTHOOD BLESSES YOU


s a young man or young woman in the Lord's restored Church today, it is an exciting time for you to be alive! You have an important role to play in a significant era in the Church and in the history of the world.

A VISIT FROM AN ANGEL

In the spring of 1829, Joseph Smith and Oliver Cowdery were in Harmony, Pennsylvania, USA, working on the translation of the Book of Mormon. When they reached the account of Jesus Christ's visit to the people of Nephi, they read that the Savior gave certain men authority to baptize (see 3 Nephi 11:18-27). This caused Joseph and Oliver to wonder whether that authority had been lost from the earth. (See Joseph Smith—History 1:71, note.)

On May 15, 1829, they sought seclusion in some nearby woods so that they could take their question to the Lord in prayer. Joseph said that while they prayed, "a messenger from heaven descended in a cloud of light, and having laid his hands upon us, he ordained us, saying:

"Upon you my fellow servants, in the name of Messiah, I confer the Priesthood of Aaron, which holds the keys of the ministering of angels, and of the gospel of repentance, and of baptism by immersion for the remission of sins; and this shall never be taken again from the earth until the sons of Levi do offer again an offering unto the Lord in righteousness" (Joseph Smith— History 1:68-69).

The angel was John the Baptist, who had the authority to baptize the Savior in his mortal life and was now a resurrected being sent to restore priesthood authority.

KEYS

John the Baptist mentioned keys of the Aaronic Priesthood, meaning its special authority to unlock power and blessings. Let's look more closely at one of the keys he mentioned and how they apply to you.

THE GOSPEL OF REPENTANCE

"The gospel of repentance" is sometimes also called "the preparatory gospel" (Doctrine and Covenants 84:26). It is what John the Baptist preached when he was in the wilderness to prepare the way of the Lord: "Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matthew 3:2).

Preaching the first principles of the gospel—faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and repentance—leads people to the first ordinances of the gospel—baptism for the remission of sins and the laying on of hands for the gift of the Holy Ghost (see Articles of Faith 1:4). In this way, people are led to "the gate by which ye should enter [which] is repentance and baptism by water; and then cometh a remission of your sins by fire and by the Holy Ghost" (2 Nephi 31:17). It is also the preaching of repentance that brings people to the sacrament and its cleansing power.

Aaronic Priesthood holders have taken upon themselves the duty to "warn, expound, exhort, and teach, and invite all to come unto Christ" (Doctrine and Covenants 20:59). And it is also the duty of "every . . . member" to raise a "warning voice . . . in mildness and in meekness" (Doctrine and Covenants 38:40–41).

The invitation to come unto Christ extends to all of God's children—both to the living and to those who have passed

YOU ARE PART OF THIS WORK


Essential parts of the Lord's work are accomplished today through the keys of the Aaronic Priesthood restored by John the Baptist. You see these keys exercised when you are baptized or partake of the sacrament and when young men administer the sacrament or baptize.

Because the Aaronic Priesthood and its keys were restored, people—you and I and others—can come unto Jesus Christ, make covenants, receive cleansing ordinances, and qualify to receive the Holy Ghost as a constant companion and as the means of ministering in a powerful way.

For you young men, your special blessing and opportunity as holders of the Aaronic Priesthood is to be of service. "The bishopric is the presidency of [the Aaronic Priesthood], and holds the keys or authority of the same" (Doctrine and Covenants 107:15). Under their direction, you will have the marvelous opportunity of serving in many capacities. Let me mention two memories of my service that were particularly touching for me.

First, I remember visiting an elderly widow whose health

MY FEAR DISAPPEARED

In the morning I was leaving for Central America.

"But what if I don't understand the language?" I thought.

"And what if I can't share what I feel?"

vividly remember my last night in the missionary training center. Six of us were leaving the next morning for Guatemala and El Salvador. Even though my experience at the MTC had gone well, that night I let fear get hold of me. "What if I don't understand what the people are saying?" I thought. "What if I can't say the words I need to say when the time comes to share what I feel?"

Looking up at the ceiling from my bunk bed, I received the impression that I needed to read from the Book of Mormon, specifically from Moroni 8. A little more than 14 months earlier I had joined the Church. As I had studied with the missionaries, one of the teachings that made a significant impression on me was that little children are innocent and not born in sin. I turned to Moroni 8:11, where Mormon clearly states this principle.

Reading the words that had helped me realize the truthfulness of the Book of Mormon before my baptism calmed me once again. Then I read on, and something truly inspiring happened. Mormon's words in Moroni 8:16–17 spoke directly to me:


"Behold, I speak with boldness, having authority from God; and I fear not what man can do; for perfect love casteth out all fear. And I am filled with charity, which is everlasting love."

The answer to my fears was simple: Love the people and your fear will go away! With that realization, my confidence was rekindled. I boarded the plane the next morning with anticipation. And when I arrived, I found that Mormon's words had taught me a true gospel principle that night. As I began to meet people for the first time, I would say in my heart, "I love you and I care about you." As I felt compassion for them, any feelings of fear would vanish and be replaced by charity and kindness.

That doesn't mean that there weren't times when I didn't understand the language. (Once I accidentally referred to someone we were teaching as a lizard!) But people would simply laugh and help me to know what to say the next time. They also showed charity and kindness, and that made it easier for me to find the right way to share the feelings of my heart about the Savior, about the Restoration, and about the Church.

How grateful I am for the message I received by reading in the Book of Mormon that night. I found that, indeed, perfect love does cast out fear. (See also 1 John 4:18.) **NE**

things our Heavenly Father has done for His children, my heart is filled with absolute amazement and gratitude at how much the Lord loves His daughters. He loves YOU!

And because He loves you, 150 years ago He inspired Church leaders to create the Young Women organization to help you become the person God wants you to become. The prophet Brigham Young (1801–77) encouraged us to strengthen our testimonies by living the gospel: "There is a need for the young daughters of Israel to get a living testimony of the truth. . . . I wish our girls to obtain a knowledge of the gospel for themselves." He also said, "More testimonies

are obtained on the feet than on the knees."²

The Young Women organization has adapted through the years to meet the needs of the time. But even as the program adapted, its objective for the young women has not changed—to help you gain a living testimony and, with faith, move forward on the covenant path. As you come to know who you are and act in faith, you will receive the blessings Heavenly Father has in store for you.

Young Women Classes through the years

When Young Women first began, it was called a "Retrenchment Association" with the goal to "improve in everything

that is good and beautiful." By the early 1900s, it became the Young Ladies' Mutual Improvement Association, and classes soon included young women ages 12 to 24. The names of classes changed over the years and included Camp Fire Girls, Beehives, Guardians, and Gleaners. As the Church grew and young women met in other countries and languages, they did their best to adapt, with names like Mia Maid becoming "Rosenmädchen" (Rose Girls) in German, for example.

Today, with young women in almost every country, classes are organized according to the needs of each ward or branch, and all are known by the unifying name of Young Women.



Requirements for the Young Women programs have also changed over the years. At right are a few of them.


The Children and Youth Program

As you look at these requirements through spiritual eyes, you will notice that they have a common thread. The past and the present come together, unified in helping young women draw closer to Jesus Christ and develop spiritually, intellectually, socially, and physically.

In 2019, a new personal development program was introduced that invites you to be both self-reliant and Saviorreliant. You are invited to seek the Holy Ghost and set your own goals as you strive to become more like our Savior. lesus Christ! I love the trust this shows in you, the remarkable young women of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

With the support of your bishopric and Young Women presidencies, you are also led by class presidencies—your peers who are called and set apart to plan and implement the Young Women program. There are over half a million young women around the world today being led by their peers!

All young women are unified by a theme, which includes these foundational principles: you are a beloved daughter of heavenly parents; you are a covenant disciple of Jesus Christ; you seek and act upon personal revelation that comes through the Holy Ghost; and you are a shining witness of God as you strive to become like our Savior, Jesus Christ, and minister to others in His Holy name.



You Are Loved and Needed!

As beloved daughters of a living and loving Heavenly Father, you have been uniquely prepared to be "saviors on Mount Zion." As President Russell M. Nelson has said: "Every prophet has talked about *our* day, when Israel would be gathered and the world would be prepared for the Second Coming of the Savior. Think of it! Of all the people who have ever lived on planet earth, *we* are the ones who get to participate in this final, great gathering event." 4

This is a sacred invitation to participate in temple and family history work, serve in leadership positions, minister to your fellow sisters, and share your testimony with your family and friends. You are loved, and you are needed!

My dear friends, Heavenly Father has a great work for you to perform in preparation for the Second Coming of our Savior Jesus Christ! You are a vital part of that work. He loves you; He wants you to take part in His work; He trusts you!

I add my faith and trust in you to that of our dear prophet, President Nelson, who declared: "You are among the best the Lord has *ever* sent to this world. You have the capacity to be smarter and wiser and have more impact on the world than any previous generation!" 5



Celebrating 150 Years

he Young Women organization is turning 150 this year, and it's time to celebrate! Check out these facts about how the organization has evolved from 1870 to today, what youth like you are doing to participate in Young Women now, and how you can be inspired by women in history who showed courage and faith.

1870-1920



Department of the Ladies' Cooperative Retrenchment Association is officially organized on May 27, 1870, under the direction of Brigham Young.¹ The name is changed to Young Ladies' Mutual Improvement Association in 1877.2

ORGANIZATION AND CLASSES:

The Bee-Hive Girls program is created as a summer program for girls age 14 and older.

IMPROVEMENT AND

RECOGNITION: The Bee-Hive Handbook is published in 1915, outlining eight "fields" of personal improvement: Religion, Home, Health, Domestic Arts, Out-of-Doors, Business, and Public Service.3

MAGAZINES AND JOURNALS:

The first issue of Young Woman's Journal is published in 1889.4 Many local Mutual Improvement Associations (or MIAs) produce their own handwritten newspapers with only one or two copies for the girls to pass around.

1920-1970

NAME: The Young Ladies' Mutual Improvement Association changes to the Young Women's Mutual Improvement Association in 1934.5

ORGANIZATION AND CLASSES:

There are two classes, Bee-Hive Girls for the younger girls and Gleaners for the older girls. The age of entry into the program changes from 14 to 12. In 1950, the Mia Maid class is introduced.



IMPROVEMENT AND RECOGNITION: The Golden Gleaner recognition marks the highest achievement young women can earn in the program.





1970-2019



MAGAZINES AND JOURNALS:

The Young Woman's Journal merges with the Improvement Era magazine for all youth in 1929.6



NAME: The Young Women's Mutual Improvement Association changes to the Young Women organization in 1974.7



ORGANIZATION AND CLASSES:

By 1972, the Young Women organization has three classes: Beehives (ages 12-13), Mia Maids (ages 14-15), and Laurels (ages 16-17). Beginning 2019, young women enter Beehives in January of the year they turn 12.

IMPROVEMENT AND RECOGNITION: The Personal

Progress program and medallion are introduced in 1977. The Young Women values of Faith, Divine Nature, Individual Worth, Knowledge, Choice and Accountability, Good Works, and Integrity are added in 1987.8 Virtue is added to the values in 2008.9

MAGAZINES AND JOURNALS:

The New Era magazine for youth begins publication in English in 1971, and the Liahona provides articles for youth in many languages.¹⁰





Fun Facts

The 1915 Bee-Hive handbook allowed young women to choose projects from over 300 different options. Some of those projects included caring for a hive of bees for a whole season, keeping

the house free from flies for two weeks, or clearing sagebrush from at least one-half acre of land.12

NAME: The name remains Young Women organization.

ORGANIZATION AND CLASSES:

Classes are organized in each ward or branch according to its needs and identified by the unifying label "Young Women" (for example, "Young Women 12," "Young Women 12-15," or just "Young Women" if they all meet together).

IMPROVEMENT AND

RECOGNITION: Children and Youth replaces the Personal Progress program. The new program encourages personalized opportunities to grow in the areas of Personal Development, Gospel Learning, and Service and Activities.11

Between the 1940s and 1960s, young women could earn emblems they sewed onto a felt band called a bandelo, which they wore across their chest. One requirement to earn an emblem was to "strive to get your full nine hours' beauty sleep each night this month." 15

General Church membership increased from about 110,000 people in 1870 ¹⁶ to more than 16 million people by 2020 ¹⁷—think of how many young women there are around the world now!

Haven's Helping Hand

aven, a 14-year-old from Utah, USA, decided to celebrate being a young woman in the Church by serving others.

"It started as a small idea," she says. "My uncle went to Bangladesh on a humanitarian trip and learned about difficult things the people there were experiencing. I wanted to help them—so I looked on the JustServe app and got the idea to make homemade kits for the refugees there."


Haven collected donations at her school, created a GoFundMe page, and even took out neighbors' garbage cans to help raise money for the kits. "I take out about 22 garbage cans and 11 recycle cans every Monday and Tuesday," she says. "I normally use the money I earn for my choir program and to save for a mission, but I decided to use my funds that month to help buy supplies instead."

Haven then went out and bought all the materials she needed for the kits, including socks, gloves, scarfs, and hats. She assembled each kit and also got in contact with the director of Lifting Hands International to coordinate the delivery of the kits in Bangladesh.

"Putting the kits together took up the most time in my project. But every time I put a piece into the kit, I knew that it would go to someone in need and that they would be blessed for a long time by it."

By the end of her project, Haven felt her confidence build in her ability to serve. "I learned from this how much help I can be if I try my hardest. I also felt compassion for the people I was helping, which helped me feel closer to the Savior and feel some of what He feels for us."





hildren and Youth is not your average improvement program. As you've noticed, there are no boxes waiting for check marks. Instead of assigning requirements to fulfill, it's designed to fit into your life so that you make the goals and the plans to achieve them.

But with fewer checklists and more flexibility, some might find it harder to know where to start—and how to stay motivated. Here's how Children and Youth can enrich your life, and how you can make goals that will keep you motivated and help you become more like the Savior.



This Program Is for You!

This change in programs means Heavenly Father is placing more trust in you to set your own goals and to plan for yourself. The Lord has said we "should be anxiously engaged in a good cause, and do many things of [our] own free will" (Doctrine and Covenants 58:27) rather than having to be told to do everything. Children and Youth is designed to be customizable to your own needs so you can choose which good things you want to pursue. As you do so prayerfully, Heavenly Father will help you throughout your life and increase your spiritual self-reliance.

One thing Children and Youth is not supposed to be is just another item on your to-do list. It's not just one more task to fit between homework, soccer practice, and scripture study. Instead, it's designed to make your life easier by providing a framework where you can set goals to improve in talents and interests you're already pursuing or want to develop—like homework, soccer, and scripture study—instead of just adding more to your plate.

Goal Setting

A big part of the Children and Youth program is making goals for spiritual, physical, social, and intellectual growth, just as the Savior "increased in wisdom and stature, and in favour with God and man" (Luke 2:52). But how do you set those goals in the first place? Here are some tips for getting started:

- 1. Begin with the end in mind. As you set each goal, keep in mind the ultimate goal of becoming like Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ.¹ Do your goals help you become more like Them? That doesn't mean every goal needs to involve scripture study, though—things like improving a talent or taking better care of your health can help you become like Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ.
- Seek revelation. The Lord can help you recognize the areas where you can improve right now.²
 Ask Him where to start!
- 3. Balance your short-term and long-term goals. Short-term goals can usually be accomplished within a few days or weeks, while long-term goals might take months or even years. It's a good idea to have both short- and long-term goals to work on.
- 4. Break it down. If you have a long-term goal such as being accepted to a college, you might want to break it down into short-term goals that you can measure, like improving your grades by studying for 30 minutes extra each day. Then make plans for how to accomplish those daily goals: What time will you start? How can you ensure you will follow through? Breaking a goal into bite-sized chunks can help you stay motivated as you accomplish each part.
- 5. Share your goals. Tell your friends, quorums and classes, leaders, and family about your goals and plans. Sharing your goals can help make you accountable, and other people might have suggestions that can help you too.

But What If I Fall Short?

There's always a risk of falling short when you set a goal. Maybe you sometimes forget to read your scriptures every day, or maybe you weren't chosen for the part you wanted in a school play. It can be discouraging if you're having trouble achieving your goals.

But guess what? The gospel is all about people who failed but kept trying. Look at Nephi, who failed to get the brass plates—twice—before finally succeeding. Or Mormon, who begged his people to repent so they wouldn't be destroyed—but was ignored. Just because they "failed" didn't mean they failed in the sight of the Lord. What He cares about is that we try. Elder Larry R. Lawrence, emeritus member of the Seventy, said: "Our Heavenly Father knows our divine potential. He rejoices every time we take a step forward. To Him, our direction is ever more important than our speed."3

With some goals, if you're struggling, maybe you need to change your plan. For instance, to help you read your scriptures every day, could you enlist the help of a friend or family member to keep you accountable? Can you set an alarm to remind yourself?

With other goals, maybe you need to adjust your approach to the goal itself. Instead of setting a goal that's ultimately out of your control, like being chosen for a lead part in a play, you could try making the goal be something within your power, like improving your acting skills by consistently rehearsing scenes with your friends.

No matter how many times you feel like you fail before making progress on your goal, don't forget that this gospel is for people who keep on trying.4 The Savior lived a perfect life to redeem our imperfect lives, and He can help you improve through the power of His Atonement, even when it feels impossible to you. As you set goals to become like Him, seek Heavenly Father's help and direction. He will help you to make righteous changes as you work to improve in all areas of your life! NE



ho can forget Ammon cutting off his attackers' arms as he defended the king's sheep? Or how his preaching led to the conversion of King Lamoni and his people? But a key part of this memorable story hinges on the faith of two women: Abish (a Lamanite servant) and the Lamanite queen (wife of King Lamoni).

Here's a refresher on what happened: Ammon and his brothers—Nephites—went on a mission to the Lamanites. The two groups weren't on great terms, to say the least, so bringing the gospel to the Lamanites was a dangerous task. But Ammon impressed King Lamoni, who asked him to be his son-in-law. Ammon instead offered to be his servant. And he greatly impressed the king by protecting his sheep (remember the cutting-off-arms story?). As King Lamoni began to learn and believe the gospel, he fell to the ground and lay there such a long time that his servants believed he was dead.

However, the queen didn't think he was dead. In fact, she trusted Ammon when he told her that. Later, the queen and everyone who was present also collapsed under the influence of the Spirit—except for Abish. Secretly, she had already been converted to the gospel and now finally saw her chance to share it with the people and invite them to come and see. (See Alma 17–19.)

So what does all this have to do with you?

Abish and the queen used their spiritual gifts to act in faith and bless others—and you can do the same!

YOUR SPIRITUAL GIFTS ARE POWERFUL

Spiritual gifts are powerful. The queen and Abish demonstrated three important spiritual gifts: believing the testimony of others, showing courage, and having faith. And exercising those three gifts brought about amazing things.

Abish was "converted unto the Lord on account of a remarkable vision of her father" (Alma 19:16)—she had chosen to have faith. And even though the queen had never heard the gospel before and barely knew Ammon, she immediately believed him. Ammon even said to her, "Blessed art thou because of thy exceeding faith; I say unto thee, woman, there has not been such great faith among all the people of the Nephites" (Alma 19:10). Imagine that!

Sometimes our spiritual gifts are less noticeable (believing doesn't have quite the visibility of healing or working miracles). Does that mean they're less important? No way! Those "quiet" gifts can be just as powerful.

If you ever feel inadequate or unsure of yourself, never fear! Heavenly Father blessed you with certain spiritual gifts and qualities for a reason. Just like Abish and the queen, you can use your gifts in significant ways! Your belief can help you to both stay strong and be an example. And through your faith, you can help lead others to Christ.



ACTING ON YOUR FAITH IS KEY

Ammon told the gueen that her husband would awake, and he did. As the king shared his conversion with his household, he collapsed again—and this time, his servants, Ammon, and the gueen did too. When Abish saw the people on the floor, she recognized it as an "opportunity" to help her people believe in the power of God, so she chose to act in faith and "ran forth from house to house" (Alma 19:17), inviting people to come and see for themselves. Abish demonstrated a principle Elder Dieter F. Uchtdorf of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles has taught: "The difference between casual social contacts and compassionate, courageous discipleship is—invitation!"1

> You can follow Abish's example by inviting others to come unto Christ. That can be scary if those around you aren't friendly toward your faith. Imagine how Abish must have felt, isolated in her faith for years among a people who hated the Nephites and their beliefs. She probably thought her prospects for sharing the gospel were pretty slim.

> You might not have much of a chance to share your beliefs either if others always mock your faith or bully you, for instance. As you follow the Spirit's direction, you may need to be patient and have faith that someday an opportunity will come. Even if those opportunities are few and far between, Heavenly Father knows your desire to share the gospel, and the Spirit can help you recognize opportunities to invite.

Abish, seeing contention stirring among the onlookers, took the queen's hand. The queen awoke and immediately began to testify of Jesus Christ to the gathered people. By doing this, she showed her faith. Hers was the first testimony of the gospel those people heard. She shared the joy she felt and then woke her husband by taking his hand. He and Ammon then also testified to the people, and many of them were converted (see Alma 19:30-33).

Acting on your faith can take different forms, just like our spiritual gifts are different. You might act by sharing your feelings about the gospel or by standing up for your beliefs. You might act by inviting others to come to an activity or to learn more about the restored gospel. Sometimes, you might act by patiently waiting and praying for missionary opportunities. But whenever that opportunity comes, take it!

RIGHTEOUS WOMEN CAN CHANGE THE WORLD

Another thing the story of Abish and the Lamanite queen shows is just how powerful the influence of righteous women can be. In fact, Sister Elaine S. Dalton, former Young Women General President, pointed out

that "the people who heard [Abish] testify became a people who 'were converted unto the Lord, [and] never did fall away,' and their sons became the stripling warriors!" Just let that sink in! Because Abish and the Lamanite queen had such great faith, they helped create a ripple effect that was felt for generations.

But that doesn't mean you have to experience something as dramatic as their story to influence the world. President Russell M. Nelson has taught that when it comes to the ability to "communicate the love of Heavenly Father and the Savior to others, . . . women have a special gift for it—a divine endowment. . . . You have special spiritual gifts and propensities. . . . I urge you, with all the hope of my heart, to pray to understand *your spiritual gifts*—to cultivate, use, and expand them, even more than you ever have. You will change the world as you do so."³

President Spencer W. Kimball also taught that the "female exemplars of the Church will be a significant force in both the numerical and the spiritual growth of the Church in the last days."

For you young women—that's you! You are the women he spoke about. The qualities Heavenly Father has given you as a beloved daughter are vital to influencing the world for good in these last days.

And for you young men, the examples Abish and the queen set are just as relevant! You can use your own spiritual gifts to believe, act, and bless others.

Heavenly Father needs *all* of you, with your unique personalities and gifts, to help build His kingdom.



No matter who you are or what your circumstances might be, you can influence others for the better through your gifts, your willingness to act and invite, and your faith in Jesus Christ. It doesn't matter if you're a queen or a servant or anything in between—you can always make a difference when you use your gifts for good. So act in faith, invite others to come unto Christ, and believe! With Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ on your side, you can make much more of a difference than you may realize. **NE**

Even when it seems like everything is gone, you still have a lot, say teens who survived the inferno in Paradise, California, USA.

felt like I was in a disaster movie," says Alex V., 18.
It was 8:30 in the morning, but the sky above Paradise,
California, USA, was dark and getting darker. Burning
embers fell through the choking, smoke-filled air. Streets
were gridlocked.

"Traffic lights would turn red and green, but no one was paying attention," Alex says. "People were screaming and honking, not moving at all. Some of them started driving on the wrong side of the road." And a wall of fire was rapidly moving toward them.

Alex called his mother: "The trees are exploding!" he said. "You mean they're on fire?" she said.

"No, they're *exploding!* They're bursting into flames, the whole tree at once!"

His Dad told him to ditch the car and meet the family in a restaurant parking lot about two-and-a-half miles away, where he was waiting with his truck. Alex has severe asthma, and he didn't have his inhaler. But he pulled over, said a quick prayer, and abandoned the car.

"When I started running," he remembers. "I immediately felt safe." He ran until he met up with his family, and eventually they escaped from the fire.

That was on November 8, 2018. Looking back today, Alex sees blessings that weren't obvious at the time:

- He had clear cell phone reception in areas that usually don't receive service.
- He had service throughout the evacuation, when service is usually so swamped it fails.
- He felt peace about what he should do.
- He was able to "run and not be weary" until he reached his family (see Doctrine and Covenants 89:20).

Like Alex, other Latter-day Saint teens who survived the destructive wildfire can now offer perspective on how they were actually blessed that day and in the days to follow. By looking beyond what they lost, they can also see what they've gained.







TOGETHER AS A FAMILY

Alex's sister, Audrey, 14, and their mother, also abandoned a car to escape the flames and then went on foot to where their dad was waiting. But their mom had surgical nerve damage in her leg and was walking—then trying to run—with a crutch.

They also had suitcases and a service dog with them.

Their dad saw them through the thick smoke, ran to help them, and got them to his truck. But where was Alex?

Soon they saw him running toward them. "At that

moment," Audrey says, "I realized that all that was important was to be together as a family. Nothing else mattered." Since then she has thought often about eternal families. "When I get impatient or upset, I stop and think about the feeling I had that day. It helps me remember that, most of all, we need to love one another."



STRENGTH IN THE TEMPLE

"I was excited for my 12th birthday," says McKell C., 12. "My family had plans to go to the temple that day. But the morning before, my mom woke me."

"Get up!" Mom said in a frantic voice. "We have to get up!"

"Mom told me there was a fire coming, that we needed to pack our things and get out," McKell says. "We evacuate a lot. We thought we'd be coming back soon, so no one really packed anything. But the Holy Ghost definitely knew that we weren't. He prompted me to grab some of my special stuff. We stayed at my grandparents' cabin that night.

"The next day, we still went to the temple. I was really excited. I have always wanted to go to the temple. That day, everyone was on their phones texting each other to know what was happening and to make sure people got out alive. There was a lot of stress.

"Right as we walked in the temple, my dad got a text from someone saying, 'Sorry, we just drove by your house and it's gone.'

"The Holy Ghost definitely helped me that day. I had a happy, relieved feeling in the temple. My cousin baptized me, and when I came out of the baptismal font, my jumpsuit was super heavy, but I actually felt really light. I forgot about how my house had burned down.

"Today, if something bad happens, I know that when I go into the temple, it's easier for me to move forward. It strengthens me every time."



THE SPIRIT TOLD ME

While her mom and dad were out of town, Aliza H., 18, was taking care of her younger siblings. It was a clear day at first, but soon the sky started getting darker and darker, the wind picked up, and small whirlwinds filled with ashes started spinning.

"I had a really strong feeling, like, 'Don't drop them off,'" she says. So she went back and checked her eight-year-old brother out of school. While she was waiting for him, she heard one of the office staff on the phone with the police. "When she hung up, she said, 'You'd better call your parents and figure out where to go, because the whole town's being evacuated."

Because of that spiritual prompting, her brother was the first one checked out of school, Aliza was able to avoid traffic jams, and with the support of Church neighbors, she was able to get herself and her siblings to safety. "I will always remember what the Spirit told me that day," she says.







TWO FAMILIES BECAME ONE

Because of the fire, two families that were already friends became even better friends sharing the same house as brothers and sisters in the gospel. "When we learned their house had burned down, we said, 'Why don't you come live with us in Chico?'" says Luke B., 11 (above left).

"Sometimes it's been a little crowded, but we've learned a lot about sharing and being

kind," Luke says.

Grady B., 14 (below left), says, "When we have home evening together, I always try to share a scripture that has helped me understand how faith can help us get through trials. I've learned that there's a lot of comfort in the scriptures." Just as there is comfort in helping each other.





I LOVE SEMINARY EVEN MORE

"We ended up living in Yuba City," says Rachel W., 17, "and so I had to get up an hour earlier just to make it to seminary in the morning. Maybe it's because of that little sacrifice to get there, but I've noticed that since the fire I love seminary even more. My day is always better and I like being with all the Paradise kids again. It's amazing to see how everyone's testimony has been strengthened after the fire."



WE'RE ALL CHILDREN OF GOD


"Grandma and Grandpa live in Oregon, so we went up there for a while and stayed with them," says Billy A., 14. "I was impressed by how kind people were to us while we were there. Now I'm back here, and I can see the community starting to rise from the ashes. It's great to see how, when people get thrown together, they do their best to help each other. It reminds us that we're all children of God."



COUNSEL FROM PRESIDENT NELSON



bout eight months into my mission in Brazil, I felt like the worst missionary ever. Nobody we were teaching was coming to church. It was difficult to find people who actually wanted to hear our message. We were striving to work hard and be obedient, but it didn't seem to be paying off.

THE DISCOURAGING DOWNPOUR

There was one day when I felt particularly down. We were searching for someone to teach, without luck, when a severe rainstorm rolled over us. The rain beat hard against our faces, and the sun faded behind huge black clouds. The streets quickly began to flood.

I couldn't believe this was happening! Here we were, trying to be diligent, and not a soul was opening their door. Now, on top of that, we had a torrent of heavy rains to trudge through. It would be hard to find someone to teach in this awful weather. I just wanted to go back to the apartment, where it was dry and quiet. The storm got worse, so I suggested we go home.

But that didn't feel right. The water was already to our calves, but a feeling came into my heart that we needed to keep walking. When I tried to ignore it, I remembered a line from our *Missionary Handbook*: "As you obey with a willing heart (see Doctrine and Covenants 64:34), you will show the Lord your love for Him" ([2010], 4).

Suddenly the warmth of God's love filled my heart and made the cold, uncomfortable rain a little more bearable. I knew we needed to obey the prompting to show our love for Him, even if it was hard. So we kept walking.

THE CALM AFTER THE STORM

The rain continued to pound as we knocked on dozens of doors. Most stayed closed. Some cracked open, only to shut seconds after. But we were determined to keep going. We even laughed as we splashed through the streets, realizing we were probably the only ones in the city crazy enough to be outside.

It was getting late when we came to a small, tin-roofed house. It was totally dark and appeared empty, but we knocked anyway. To our surprise, a woman answered and quickly invited us in to get shelter from the rain. We were so excited that someone had finally let us in!



DRAW NEAR TO HIM

"No matter our distress, no matter our sorrow, no matter our mistakes, our infinitely compassionate Heavenly Father desires that we draw near to Him so that He can draw near to us."

The woman's husband and two kids were there, and they smiled at us—apparently unbothered by the fact that we were dripping all over their floor. We introduced ourselves and asked if we could share a message about Jesus Christ, and they accepted.

The Spirit was present as we prayed with them and for them. They talked about the many struggles they'd had and how they felt a need to reconnect with God. There was a still, peaceful feeling that completely contradicted the violent tempest outside. It was the calm after the literal storm for us and, in many ways, the calm after a figurative storm for this family who had been through so much.

CHANGED BY THE RAIN

Throughout the next few days, I reflected on how silly it now seemed that I had thought my success as a missionary depended only on how many investigators came to church. What really mattered was helping people build relationships with God and find peace in Jesus Christ, even when they faced turbulent times. Doing this strengthened my own relationship with God.

I was transferred shortly after, and although I couldn't keep teaching that family, I knew I'd always be grateful for the lesson I learned that night. The rainstorm had made me a better missionary and a better person.

BRIGHTER DAYS

I completed my mission 10 months later. The week I returned home, I got a message on social media from a 17-year-old boy named Lucas. His profile picture looked familiar.

He told me that almost a year ago, my companion and I had come to his house during a rainstorm. He was moved by what we shared, and a few weeks later, he decided to go to church. He took the missionary lessons and eventually was baptized.

A feeling of gratitude swept over me as I remembered the peaceful evening we'd shared with his family. Heavenly Father had not only comforted me during that stormy time, but He had also shown Lucas how much He loved him by sending us to his family. My life had changed in that rainstorm, and so had Lucas's.

Today, Lucas is serving as a full-time missionary in Brazil. He'll face storms too, probably both literal and figurative, just as my companion and I did—just as we all do. But when we recognize God's love for us and strive to show our love by obeying Him, we can make it through any weather. We can confront the storms, brave the heavy rains, and look forward to brighter, sunnier days. NE

Do people with intellectual disabilities automatically go to the celestial kingdom?

Jesus Christ ministered one by one to people who were "afflicted in any manner" (see 3 Nephi 17:9). Likewise, persons with intellectual disabilities should be regarded *individually*.

We know that children under eight years old have not reached the "years of accountability" (see Doctrine and Covenants 137:10; see also 68:25, 27) and therefore "need no ... baptism" and "are alive in Christ" (Moroni 8:11–12). Similarly, some people who have not developed language or intellectual skills to a sufficient level may not be accountable before the Lord. Families work with bishops to determine whether a person with intellectual disabilities should be baptized and receive other ordinances, considering the person's own wishes, degree of understanding, and worthiness.

The Prophet Joseph Smith taught, "All the minds and spirits that God ever sent into the world are susceptible of enlargement" (*Teachings of Presidents of the Church: Joseph Smith* [2007], 210). This includes those with intellectual disabilities, who are here to gain their own experience and fulfill Heavenly Father's plan of happiness for them. Like anyone else, they need to be taught the gospel and strive for personal growth in this life. Our job is to love and serve all of God's children and help each other come closer to Christ. **NE**

but I still couldn't make it to state! I only had one season left before I graduated, so I pinned all my hopes on it.


Then the district meet came—my last chance to qualify for state. And I lost. I failed.


